Demolition of the Old Fitzroy River Bridge

The broken Fitzroy River bridge will be demolished this week to make way for the new two-lane bridge.

Works are planned to start on Thursday morning starting on the west side of the river. To bring the bridge down, equipment will work from the temporary construction causeway, which has been built next to the bridge.

A 50-tonne excavator will take approximately one day to break up the top of the bridge using shears.

The segments will be collected and loaded into trucks, to be transported and stored in the construction area on the side of the river. A bund will be put in the river, so loose material is also collected. The material will then be sorted into concrete and steel for recycling.

The excavator will then be used to pull the remaining piles (sticks holding the bridge up) and the ends of the old bridge, the abutments, out of the riverbed. The piles and abutments will be removed from the river and stored in the construction site to be recycled and possibly reused around town.



Works will continue for a few days removing any bridge materials left in the river and placing them in the construction site.

Once the demolition is complete, piling will start. Piling is the work undertaken to install the new bridge piles (sticks) into the riverbed. There are 34 new piles which will be driven into the ground by a crawler crane with a vibrating hammer. Each pile consists of two pile casings, each 21 metre long, which will be welded together on site and infilled with steel reinforcement and concrete. This work will be ongoing until early August.

Local residents may experience some noise and vibrations during this time. Although vibrations can be uncomfortable for some people, it shouldn't cause any damage to property.

To watch any of the works on the bridge, please follow the signs and keep to the safe viewing areas near the barge landing areas.

LOW LEVEL CROSSING

The low level crossing is open. Semitrailers are the largest heavy vehicles allowed to travel on the crossing.

Small road train breakdown/assembly areas have been set up on each side of the river to let road trains take their trailers across one at a time.

ROAD UPDATE - GIBB RIVER ROAD

Gibb River Road is open to all vehicles from Lennard River to Great Northern Highway. 4WDs with high clearance are recommended for unsealed roads.

Take extra care, reduce speed, and look for signage to make your drive safe.

The team at the Flood Hub at the Fitzroy Crossing Visitor Centre can help you apply. Identification, proof of address and evidence of damage to your home is needed before you visit. The Flood Hub people can also visit your community if you can't come into the Hub.

INTEREST RATE SUBSIDY FOR FLOOD-AFFECTED SMALL BUSINESSES

If you are a small business owner affected by the Kimberley floods, you might be able to get a 4% interest rate on new loans to either repair damaged assets or off-set business carry on costs incurred due to the flooding.

To apply for this, you should:

- be a registered small business with an ABN
- employ less than 20 full-time staff
- operate locally and your main source of income is from the business
- be able to show that the loan required is because of the flooding.

Wastewater pipe installation success

Water Corporation's new wastewater pipe is complete and is now taking the town's wastewater under the riverbed and across to the treatment plant on the other side.

When the old main (that was attached to the bridge) broke, Water Corporation had to quickly build a new one before the bridge was demolished.

They did this by using Horizontal Directional Drilling, where the pipe is drilled around 30m below the riverbed so it's protected from any future floods.

Water Corporation thanks the community for your patience and understanding throughout the flooding while we worked through a solution for the broken pipe.
