#### NATURE OF COUNCIL'S ROLE IN DECISION MAKING

Advocacy: When Council advocates on its own behalf or on behalf of its

community to another level of government/body/agency.

Executive/Strategic: The substantial direction setting and oversight role of the Council

such as adopting plans and reports, accepting tenders, directing

operations, grants, and setting and amending budgets.

Legislative: Includes adopting local laws, town planning schemes and policies.

Employees must disclose the nature of their interest in reports or advice when giving the report or advice to the meeting (Sections 5.70 and 5.71 of the *Local Government Act 1995*).

#### **APPLICATION FOR LEAVE OF ABSENCE**

In accordance with Section 2.25 of the *Local Government Act 1995*, an application for leave requires a Council resolution granting leave requested. Council may grant approval for Leave of Absence for a Council Member for ordinary Council meetings for up to but not more than six consecutive meetings. The approval of the Minister is required for leave of absence greater than six ordinary Council meetings.

This approval must be by Council resolution and differs from the situation where a Council Member records their apologies for the meeting. A failure to observe the requirements of the Act that relates to absence from meetings can lead to a Council Member being disqualified should they be absent without leave for three consecutive meetings.

#### 12.1 LOCAL GOVERNMENT ACT (LGA) SALE - UNIT 1, 2, 3 / 18 CORKWOOD COURT

#### **SUMMARY**

Council to authorise progression of power of sale for unpaid rates of more than three years at Units 1-3 / 18 Corkwood Court, Derby under Subdivision 6 (6.68) of the *Local Government Act*.

#### **DISCLOSURE OF ANY INTEREST**

Nil by Author and Responsible Officer.

#### **BACKGROUND**

The three properties to be considered in this item are owned by a now de-registered company under the name of Shai Holdings PTY LTD. The total and individual rates balances are depicted below;

The proprietors of Shai Holdings PTY LTD have been subject to bankruptcy proceedings for the past three years. As part of this process the Shire had held off any recovery action under the assumption that as these were assets linked to the individuals the rates would have been recovered at the conclusion of an asset liquidation process. It has since been confirmed by the insolvency agency that no such sale will be occurring. As Shai Holdings PTY LTD and the individual proprietors are legally separate entities there will not be a forced sale of these properties by the insolvency agency. With this confirmation and with rates debts over three years the Shire is now able to commence the LGA sale process.

A standard part of this process involves a reasonable attempt at recovery prior to sale (detailed in section 6.56 of the Act) which involves letters of demand and a General Procedure Claim through the Magistrate's court. The Shire can seek an exemption from this step under 6.68 (2)(b) "having made reasonable efforts to locate the owner of the property is unable to do so." The Shire is satisfied that having searched the ASIC database and finding that Shai Holdings PTY LTD is a deregistered company, a reasonable attempt to locate the property owners has been made. As the company legally no longer exists the owner therefore cannot be located.

CS Legal have advised the Shire will need to provide documentation for the LGA sale to ASIC who then provide 21 days for the proprietors of Shai Holdings PTY LTD to re-instate the company. If this

were to occur, the ability to seek an exemption from section 6.56 would be removed. If the company is not re-registered the Shire will then need to seek approval from ASIC to continue with the LGA sale against the de-registered company. CS Legal have advised that ASIC approval is highly likely based on similar instances.

#### STATUTORY ENVIRONMENT

Local government act 1995 references

Subdivision 6 — Actions against land where rates or service charges unpaid

#### 6.56. Rates or service charges recoverable in court

(1) If a rate or service charge remains unpaid after it becomes due and payable, the local government may recover it, as well as the costs of proceedings, if any, for that recovery, in a court of competent jurisdiction.

#### 6.64. Actions to be taken

- (1) If any rates or service charges which are due to a local government in respect of any rateable land have been unpaid for at least 3 years the local government may, in accordance with the appropriate provisions of this Subdivision take possession of the land and hold the land as against a person having an estate or interest in the land and
  - (a) from time to time lease the land; or
  - (b) sell the land; or
  - (c) cause the land to be transferred to the Crown; or
  - (d) cause the land to be transferred to itself.
- (2) On taking possession of any land under this section, the local government is to give to the owner of the land such notification as is prescribed and then to affix on a conspicuous part of the land a notice, in the form or substantially in the form prescribed.
- (3) Where payment of rates or service charges imposed in respect of any land is in arrears the local government has an interest in the land in respect of which it may lodge a caveat to preclude dealings in respect of the land, and may withdraw caveats so lodged by it.

#### 6.68. Exercise of power to sell land

- (1) Subject to subsection (2), a local government is not to exercise its power under section 6.64(1)(b) (in this Subdivision and Schedule 6.3 referred to as the power of sale) in relation to any land unless, within the period of 3 years prior to the exercise of the power of sale, the local government has at least once attempted under section 6.56 to recover money due to it.
- (2) A local government is not required to attempt under section 6.56 to recover money due to it before exercising the power of sale where the local government
  - (a) has a reasonable belief that the cost of the proceedings under that section will equal or exceed the value of the land; or
  - (b) having made reasonable efforts to locate the owner of the property is unable to do so.
- (3A) A local government is to ensure that a decision to exercise a power of sale without having, within the period of 3 years prior to the exercise of the power of sale, attempted under section 6.56 to recover the money due to it and the reasons for the decision are recorded in the minutes of the meeting at which the decision was made.

(3) Schedule 6.3 has effect in relation to the exercise of the power of sale.

It is likely that the full rates debt will be recovered in addition to applicable legal expenses. The aforementioned exemption from 6.56 as well as the sale itself is contingent upon ASIC approval however it is likely that this approval will be granted.

#### **BACKGROUND**

    - (d) sufficient information to identify the transaction.
  - (2) A list of accounts for approval to be paid is to be prepared each month showing —

- (a) for each account which requires Council authorisation in that month
  - (i) the payee's name; and
  - (ii) the amount of the payment; and
  - (iii) sufficient information to identify the transaction; and
- (b) the date of the meeting of the council to which the list is to be presented.
- (3) A list prepared under sub regulation (1) or (2) is to be
  - (a) presented to the council at the next ordinary meeting of the Council after the list is prepared; and
  - (b) recorded in the minutes of that meeting.

### 1 BASIS OF PREPARATION AND MATERIAL ACCOUNTING POLICIES

#### **BASIS OF PREPARATION**

This prescribed financial report has been prepared in accordance with the *Local Government Act 1995* and accompanying regulations.

### Local Government Act 1995 requirements

Section 6.4(2) of the Local Government Act 1995 read with the Local Government (Financial Management) Regulations 1996, prescribe that the financial report be prepared in accordance with the Local Government Act 1995 and, to the extent that they are not inconsistent with the Act, the Australian Accounting Standards. The Australian Accounting Standards (as they apply to local governments and not-for-profit entities) and Interpretations of the Australian Accounting Standards Board were applied where no inconsistencies exist.

The Local Government (Financial Management) Regulations 1996 specify that vested land is a right-of-use asset to be measured at cost, and is considered a zero cost concessionary lease. All right-of-use assets under zero cost concessionary leases are measured at zero cost rather than at fair value, except for vested improvements on concessionary land leases such as roads, buildings or other infrastructure which continue to be reported at fair value, as opposed to the vested land which is measured at zero cost. The measurement of vested improvements at fair value is a departure from AASB 16 which would have required the Shire to measure any vested improvements at zero cost.

Local Government (Financial Management) Regulations 1996, regulation 34 prescribes contents of the financial report. Supplementary information does not form part of the financial report.

Accounting policies which have been adopted in the preparation of this financial report have been consistently applied unless stated otherwise. Except for cash flow and rate setting information, the financial report has been prepared on the accrual basis and is based on historical costs, modified, where applicable, by the measurement at fair value of selected non-current assets, financial assets and liabilities.

### Matters of non-compliance with Basis of Preparation

The following matters of non-compliance with the basis of preparation have not been corrected.

- 1. Depreciation is yet to be raised during the current financial year.
- 2. Balances as at 30 June 2024 have not been finalised and will be subject to change.

#### THE LOCAL GOVERNMENT REPORTING ENTITY

All funds through which the Shire controls resources to carry on its functions have been included in the financial statements forming part of this financial report.

All monies held in the Trust Fund are excluded from the financial statements.

### MATERIAL ACCOUNTING POLICES

Material accounting policies utilised in the preparation of these statements are as described within the 2024-25 Annual Budget. Please refer to the adopted budget document for details of these policies.

### Critical accounting estimates and judgements

The preparation of a financial report in conformity with Australian Accounting Standards requires management to make judgements, estimates and assumptions that effect the application of policies and reported amounts of assets and liabilities, income and expenses.

The estimates and associated assumptions are based on historical experience and various other factors believed to be reasonable under the circumstances; the results of which form the basis of making the judgements about carrying values of assets and liabilities that are not readily apparent from other sources.

Actual results may differ from these estimates.

As with all estimates, the use of different assumptions could lead to material changes in the amounts reported in the financial report.

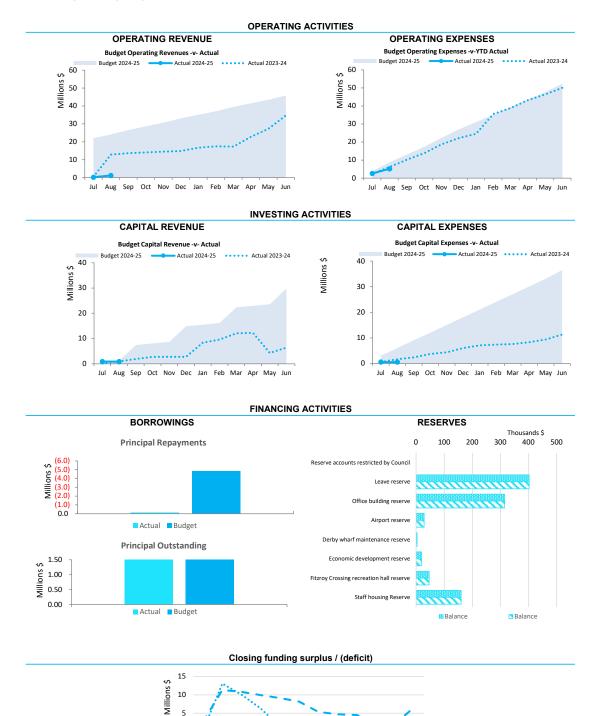

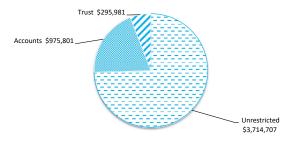

#### Initial recognition

An item of property, plant and equipment or infrastructure that qualifies for recognition as an asset is measured at its cost.

Upon initial recognition, cost is determined as the amount paid (or other consideration given) to acquire the assets, plus costs incidental to the acquisition. The cost of non-current assets constructed by the Shire includes the cost of all materials used in construction, direct labour on the project and an appropriate proportion of variable and fixed overheads. For assets acquired at zero cost or otherwise significantly less than fair value, cost is determined as fair value at the date of acquisition.

Assets for which the fair value as at the date of acquisition is under \$5,000 are not recognised as an asset in accordance with *Local Government (Financial Management) Regulation 17A(5)*. These assets are expensed immediately.

Where multiple individual low value assets are purchased together as part of a larger asset or collectively forming a larger asset exceeding the threshold, the individual assets are recognised as one asset and capitalised.

Individual assets that are land, buildings and infrastructure acquired between scheduled revaluation dates of the asset class in accordance with the Shire's revaluation policy, are recognised at cost and disclosed as being at reportable value.

#### Measurement after recognition

Plant and equipment including furniture and equipment and right-of-use assets (other than vested improvements) are measured using the cost model as required under *Local Government (Financial Management) Regulation 17A(2)*. Assets held under the cost model are carried at cost less accumulated depreciation and any impairment losses being their reportable value.

#### Reportable Value

In accordance with Local Government (Financial Management) Regulation 17A(2), the carrying amount of non-financial assets that are land and buildings classified as property, plant and equipment, investment properties, infrastructure or vested improvements that the local government controls.

Reportable value is for the purpose of *Local Government (Financial Management) Regulation 17A(4)* is the fair value of the asset at its last valuation date minus (to the extent applicable) the accumulated depreciation and any accumulated impairment losses in respect of the non-financial asset subsequent to its last valuation date.

#### **KEY INFORMATION**

#### **Provisions**

Provisions are recognised when the Shire has a present legal or constructive obligation, as a result of past events, for which it is probable that an outflow of economic benefits will result and that outflow can be reliably measured.

Provisions are measured using the best estimate of the amounts required to settle the obligation at the end of the reporting period.

#### **Employee Related Provisions**

#### Short-term employee benefits

Provision is made for the Shire's obligations for short-term employee benefits. Short-term employee benefits are benefits (other than termination benefits) that are expected to be settled wholly before 12 months after the end of the annual reporting period in which the employees render the related service, including wages, salaries and sick leave. Short-term employee benefits are measured at the (undiscounted) amounts expected to be paid when the obligation is settled.

The Shire's obligations for short-term employee benefits such as wages, salaries and sick leave are recognised as a part of current trade and other payables in the calculation of net current assets.

#### Other long-term employee benefits

The Shire's obligations for employees' annual leave and long service leave entitlements are recognised as employee related provisions in the statement of financial position.

Long-term employee benefits are measured at the present value of the expected future payments to be made to employees. Expected future payments incorporate anticipated future wage and salary levels, durations of service and employee departures and are discounted at rates determined by reference to market yields at the end of the reporting period on government bonds that have maturity dates that approximate the terms of the obligations. Any remeasurements for changes in assumptions of obligations for other long-term employee benefits are recognised in profit or loss in the periods in which the changes occur. The Shire's obligations for long-term employee benefits are presented as non-current provisions in its statement of financial position, except where the Shire does not have an unconditional right to defer settlement for at least 12 months after the end of the reporting period, in which case the obligations are presented as current provisions.

#### **Contract liabilities**

An entity's obligation to transfer goods or services to a customer for which the entity has received consideration (or the amount is due) from the customer.

#### Capital grant/contribution liabilities

Grants to acquire or construct recognisable non-financial assets to identified specifications be constructed to be controlled by the Shire are recognised as a liability until such time as the Shire satisfies its obligations under the agreement.

It is important to note that the Kimberley Zone of WALGA is a group established to represent regional issues to the State Council of WALGA. This group includes the four Kimberley Shires in addition to the Shires of Christmas Island and Cocos Keeling Islands.

The KRG is a group defined through a deed of agreement between the four Kimberley local governments with the Minister for Local Government.

#### **Kimberley Regional Group (KRG) meeting:**

#### **Election Strategy and Advocacy:**

A pre-election strategy was discussed to secure commitments from the state and federal governments for investments in Kimberley infrastructure and services. The strategy includes updating the KRG Investment Prospectus, developing election summary documents, and launching advocacy and engagement plans for the 2025 elections.

#### **Shared Services:**

The group explored the possibility of shared services among Kimberley Councils to improve efficiency and reduce costs due to remoteness and skill shortages. The discussion centered around different governance models that could facilitate this initiative.

#### **Financial Report:**

The KRG reported a current surplus position of \$391,962 as of March 2024, with discussions around projects for improving financial assistance grants, crime prevention, and benchmarking across the Kimberley.

#### **Housing and Crime Prevention:**

The Kimberley Housing Roundtable, planned for July 2024, is a key step in addressing housing shortages, while the group is also focused on crime prevention strategies through a Local Government community safety package.

#### **Regional Infrastructure Projects:**

Various infrastructure initiatives were highlighted, including new developments at Broome Port and the Brooking Channel Bridge replacement

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These key items demonstrate the group's focus on election advocacy, regional collaboration, financial management, housing, and crime prevention, as well as the continued development of infrastructure to support regional growth.

# The Kimberley Zone of the Western Australian Local Government Association (WALGA) meeting:

#### **WALGA State Council Agenda:**

Major topics discussed included caravan park and camping regulations, audit experiences, and policy advocacy positions. WALGA continues to advocate for local government reforms and community-related issues, such as housing affordability and sustainability.

#### **Matters for Decision:**

Discussion on issues like the advocacy for tiny homes on wheels (THOWs) as an affordable housing solution, updates to the audit process, and regional planning strategies like the Caravan and Camping Grounds Regulations.

#### **Reports and Updates:**

Key reports were presented from WALGA representatives, including discussions on environmental policy, infrastructure projects, and waste management. Topics like urban greening, regional telecommunications, and housing were also highlighted.

### WALGA's Efforts to Become an Employer Organisation:

A significant part of the meeting included WALGA's ongoing advocacy to become a registered employer organization. The association is facing challenges due to legal and constitutional complexities but continues to push for industrial reforms.

These points indicate the Kimberley Zone's focus on advocating for local government sustainability, housing solutions, and better governance structures, while collaborating with WALGA to improve the region's infrastructure and environmental policies.

## **Watching Brief**

Aboriginal Heritage Act: Now pending Department updates on rescinded legislation. On 15 November 2023, the *Aboriginal Heritage Act 1972* was restored as the legislation that manages Aboriginal heritage in Western Australia some amendments drawn from feedback from consultation. Approval is only required where there is potential for any harm to an Aboriginal site.

WA Development Index – response received from the Department of Local Government, Sport and Cultural Industries. To be raised with the new Minister for Local Government.

Banned Drinkers Register – Legislation passed. KRG media release issued and picked up in local papers. Implementation and outcomes will be monitored.

State government funding to support young people in the Kimberley. Cr McCumstie is the KRG observer member on the Aboriginal Youth Wellbeing Steering Committee (AYWSC) and will provide updates as required. Note the Aboriginal Regional Governance Group (ARRG) has been undertaking media expressing disappointment at the lack of government commitment to implement recommendations of reports into youth suicide in the Kimberley. New \$4M community-led Immediate Response Night Space (IRNS) service for young people in Broome. There is no overarching youth justice strategy for the region.

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Tanami Road funding – Letter sent to Minister Catherine King on 28/05/23. Response received. Commonwealth confirmation that the project would proceed and an additional \$200M funding announced 16/11/2023. KRG media release issues and picked up in local papers. Shire of Halls Creek leading work on a Tanami Activation Strategy.

First Point of Entry (FPOE) Wyndham and Broome - Minister King announced in February 2024 that work will be undertaken for the enhanced FPOE status for Broome. This includes working with Border Force and the Department of Agriculture, Fisheries and Forestry.

North West Defence and Border Security – April 2024 letter sent to State and Federal Government expressing concern. No response received to date

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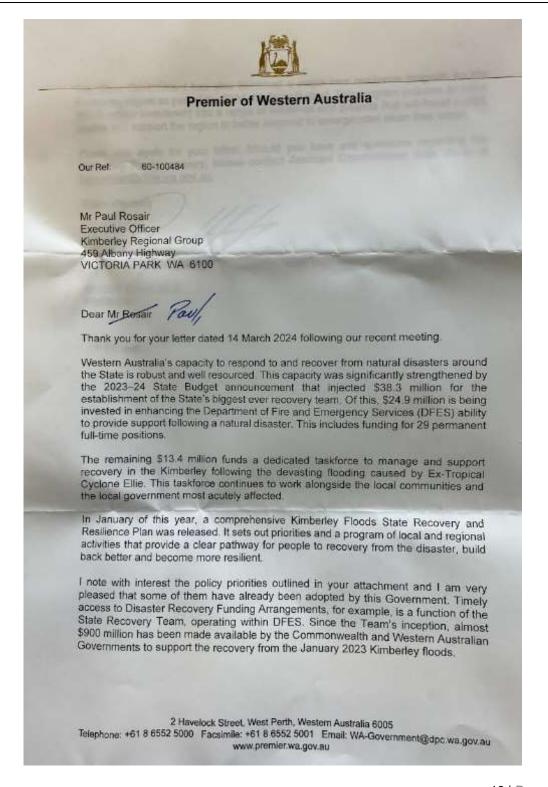

## **Purpose**

To update the KRG members on the financial position of the Group.

# **Summary**

This report presents the Kimberley Regional Group Interim Financial Activity Statement for the period ended 31 March 2024. The report recommends that the Kimberley Regional Group (KRG) receives the Financial Activity Statement.

# **Background**

#### Previous Considerations

The KRG adopted its annual budget for the 2023/24 Financial year at the meeting on 13 April 2023. At this meeting a report relating to the finances for the financial year to 30 June 2023 was approved by the KRG. This report is for the financial activity for Quarter 3 of the 2023/24 financial year. Quarterly reports will be tabled at meetings as soon after the end of each quarter as is practical.

#### **Discussion**

The Financial Activity Statement presents a current surplus position of \$391,962 which is represented by a cash balance held in a Reserve with the Shire of Wyndham East Kimberley. All outstanding amounts have been paid by members.

Adjustments arising from the approval of the 2023/24 Annual Budget were included at the last KRG meeting. It was agreed the contributions were maintained at \$45,000. The surplus cash was allocated to a line item "Kimberley Regional Group – Projects" in the amount of \$20,000 in order to maintain parity between income and expenditure. Four projects were considered and approved. The first two projects below were subject to a procurement process and were awarded to NAJA Business Consulting Services as providing the best value for money. The remaining two were approved for the Secretariat to conduct the work. The projects are:

- Review of Financial Assistance Grants estimated \$24,500
- KRG Community Safety and Crime Prevention Investment Package estimated \$18,000
- Benchmarking estimated \$15,000
- Pre State and Federal Government Election Strategy estimated \$7,600

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The total of these projects is \$65,100 against a budget of \$20,000. It was proposed that the projects budget be increased by \$45,000 to \$65,000 and funded from cash reserves. No expenses were recorded against the projects at the reporting date.

As reported previously, Members will note that there still remains an amount of \$10,000 for the North West Defence Alliance (NWDA). This is retained for members should the KRG require any budget for activity related to this initiative.

# STATUTORY ENVIRONMENT Local Government Act 1995

## **Financial Implications**

As at the 30 June 2023 the Kimberley Regional Group cash balance \$262,476 and outstanding contributions of \$45,000 carried forward to the 2023/24 financial year giving a total surplus position of 307,476.

For the period ending 31 March 2024 Expenses of \$97,082 were paid against a year-to-date budget of \$172,500. No disbursements have been made against Canberra Delegation Expenses (\$5,250) and NWDA (\$7,500) so far. Only \$1350 has been disbursed for Projects as at 31 March 2024 against a year-to-date budget of \$48,750. A Canberra trip is planned for August 2024 and these expenses are expected to fall in the next financial year. Some project expenses are expected to be paid before the end of the financial year but the majority will be expected to be paid into the next financial year.

The year-to-date budget income was \$228,750 while the actual income is \$226,569. No reimbursements have been recouped from members as expenditure has been well under budget for the year thus far. An interest allocation will be made at the end of the financial year. The year-to-date actual budget surplus is \$129,487.

The total Kimberley Regional Group cash balance at 31 March 2024 is \$391,962 which represents the total of the Members interests at that date.

## **Purpose**

To commence discussion on whether shared services is something that KRG members would like to explore.

# In summary

- Due to remoteness, skill shortages and cost it can be difficult for local governments to access the services that they require in a cost effective way.
- One way Western Australian Councils have addressed this is through a shared services approach to access greater economies of scale.
- There are a number of different models used by Councils to share services.
- Before considering a shared services model, discussion is needed on the drivers for this approach
  and what benefits may accrue. This includes identifying what services could be effectively shared,
  by whom, and why. Following this, discussion should occur on the best way to progress this
  including a governance model.
- It must be noted that shared services are distinguished from managed services, where an organisation outsources specific functions to another entity i.e. outsourcing management of an airport or financial management to another Council.

#### **Background**

The aim of this discussion is not a governance model for shared services but whether at an operational level sharing services would assist Kimberley Shires to make operations more efficient and effective.

In June 2023 the KRG considered governance models for the KRG's operation. The models examined included:

- 1. A Voluntary Regional Organisation of Councils
- 2. A Regional Local Government Model
- 3. Regional Subsidiary Model
- 4. Establishing a Not For Profit Entity

It was agreed that a voluntary regional organisation of Councils was the best governance model at this time for the KRG. It must be noted that a number of these models are used by Councils to share services.



## **Details**

A 2022 Report from the University of Tasmania 2022, *Options for Sharing Services in Tasmanian Local Governments*, establishes principles for the successful sharing of services, then outlines a range of government models relevant to Tasmanian councils<sup>1</sup>. Whilst the focus of the research was Tasmanian Councils, the principles apply to local governments in any jurisdictions considering sharing services. These are:

1.	Address an agreed problem	Identify and agree on the problem to be solved and the desired outcome (e.g., efficiency, effectiveness, expanded service offerings, more sustainable staffing systems, etc). Robust and reliable baseline data are essential to determining the most suitable model of service sharing and evaluating its performance over time.
2.	Engage authentically and try to build consensus	Arrangements built on trust and mutual goodwill are likely to present a more attractive reform proposition than forced or compulsory ones. While differences of opinion are inevitable, genuine engagement with the sector is more conducive to progress than unilateral or antagonistic approaches.
3.	Focus on areas of common interest and need	At least initially, focus on areas where there are common interests and mutual benefits and value from sharing
4.	Aim to build scale and scope incrementally	Many shared services arrangements gradually evolve and 'snowball' over time into more comprehensive, enduring partnerships. Supporting evolution towards a more systematic shared services framework not only pays dividends in its own right, but also helps to build the compatibility and complementarity that prepare councils for more involved or far-reaching shared services reforms.
5.	Ensure local accountability and responsiveness to local need	Arrangements in which councils lose too much autonomy or feel disempowered, can threaten local governments' ability to represent local preferences, Agree on longer-term outcome targets and report progress and benefits (or otherwise) over time.
6.	Share risks and rewards	Arrangements in which one council shoulders more risk than others – or, alternatively, reaps greater rewards – are more likely to end in conflict than ones in which equitable sharing is a guiding and intentional design feature.
7.	Incentivise and support the transition	Shared service arrangements almost inevitably involve at least some degree of realignment of council priorities or resources. Sensitive and equitable transition arrangements are vital to ensure that councillors, staff, and communities are kept on side.
8.	Discuss and agree upon the best governance model	This should be done while noting that there will be trade- offs and compromises. Even the most successful shared service arrangements can succumb to self-interest or interna disagreement unless robust, independent governance structures are in place.

The Shire of Irwin and the Shire of Chapman Valley have been advancing a project to implement a shared services model for Corporate Services. The two Shires are setting up a Local Government Corporate Services Alliance (LGCSA) Association. The LGCSA will be a single independent service delivery entity responsible for delivering selected Corporate Services functions for its members. The LGSCA Association will purchase and manage the software required to deliver its services. Member LGAs would in turn have access to the software to view and manage their individual LGAs data.

Shire of Irwin CEO, Shane Ivers, has offered to share his learnings and provide an update on the project to the KRG.

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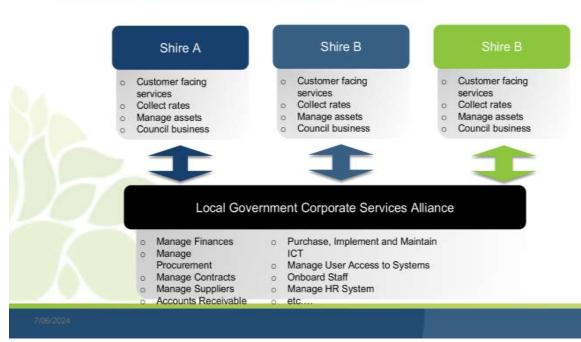

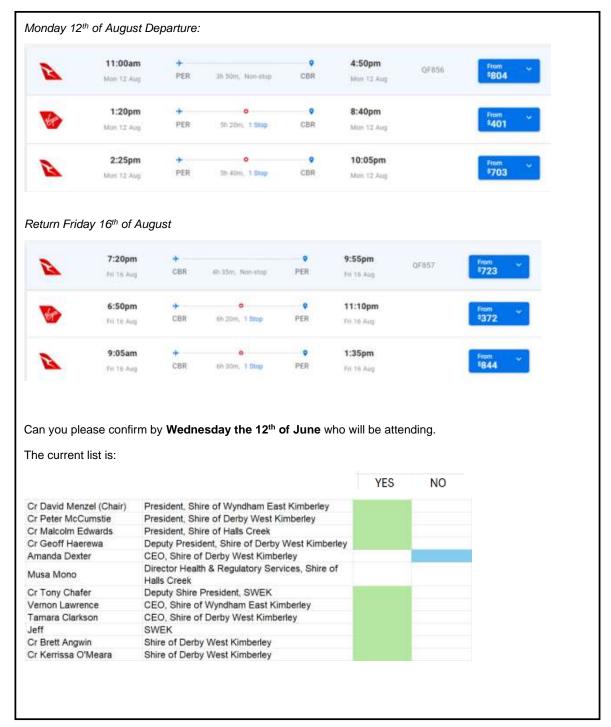

To provide a brief summary of regional and Kimberley initiatives in 2023/24 Federal and State government budgets to inform the election strategy and advocacy.

#### In summary

- The Western Australian Budget 2024/25 was handed down on the 9th of May 2024.
- The Federal Budget 2024/25 was handed down on the 14<sup>th of</sup> May 2024.
- Both budgets have been delivered in the year before a State and Federal Election which means there are likely to be new budget announcements over the next 12 months.
- A high-level summary of initiatives has been complied by the Executive Team.
- Information from these budgets will be used to inform the KRG election strategy, advocacy, and engagement.

#### Details

#### State Budget 2024/25

Kimberley residents will benefit from the WA Government's \$762 million investment in cost of living relief measures, \$1.1 billion in housing and homelessness services, \$3.2 billion investment in health, \$6.4 B investment in country roads and regional transport infrastructure funding focused on diversifying regional economies and creating quality local jobs and \$536 million new investment for environmental protections. A summary overview is attached. Specific Kimberley initiatives include the following<sup>2</sup>:

- \$5 million for the Broome North Waranyjarri Estate, delivering sustainable housing in the Kimberley.
- \$2.6 million for stockyard upgrades at the Kununurra checkpoint.
- \$14.6 million to continue the Kimberley Ambulance Service.

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- \$53.6 million towards the replacement of the single-lane Brooking Channel Bridge, which will enhance road safety and provide ongoing employment for Fitzroy Valley workers\$6 million in new infrastructure at the Port of Broome to build greater import capabilities and boost supply chains.
- 6 million in new infrastructure at the Port of Broome to build greater import capabilities and boost supply chains.
- \$1.2 million for four full-time staff to repair stream gauging stations damaged by Tropical Cyclone Filie
- \$4.5 million for Horizon Power to buy out existing power stations at Ardyaloon, Bidyadanga, Beagle Bay, Djarindjin-Lombadina and Warmun.
- \$1.9 million for the Buccaneer Archipelago Marine Park.
- \$1.6 million for the Fitzroy River National Park.
- \$1 million to upgrade the Kurrajong and Walardi campgrounds at Purnululu National Park.
- \$1.8 million to continue establishment and operation of the East Kimberley Place-Based Partnership (BBY Kununurra).
- \$1.3 million to continue the Bidyadanga project, a placed-based partnership to enable a 'town like' community in Bidyadanga.

Other initiatives outlined in Minister Buti's release as Minister for Aboriginal Affairs Release 3

- \$8 million invested in further priority airstrip renewals in remote communities in the Kimberley.
- \$4.5 million in 2024-25 for the remediation of illegally dumped asbestos within the Nyamba Buru Yawuru's Yinajalan Ngarrungunil Health and Wellbeing Campus site in Broome;
- \$2.7 million to support implementation of the Kimberley Partnership Agreement by the Mental Health Commission.

Other critical infrastructure projects currently being delivered and recently completed including4:

- the replacement of the Fitzroy River Bridge (\$250 million);
- the replacement of three single-lane bridges on the Great Northern Highway at Arthur Creek, Tickalara Creek and Frog Hollow Creek (\$33 million joint Federal and State Government investment);
- sealing 313 kilometres of the Tanami Road (\$542.7 million joint Federal and State Government investment): and
- sealing the runway at Warmun airstrip (\$5 million).

#### Australian Local Government Association (ALGA) analysis<sup>6</sup>

ALGA's summary of the Federal budget is as follows -

- No restoring Financial Assistance Grants to at least one per cent of Commonwealth taxation revenue
- A \$155 million increase in Financial Assistance Grants this year. However, this increase is the
  result of the legislated indexation formula, and far below the fair increases promised by the
  Government.
- Celebrate the aim of the Government's new \$100 million National Active Transport Fund, but it doesn't make sense to exclude councils from applying
- An extra \$150 million for the Roads to Recovery program, as well as a commitment to increase this funding to \$1 billion per year over the forward estimates.

The budget outlines in the chapter on Better transport for cities, regions and suburbs, investment in infrastructure for each jurisdiction. The budget has \$8.9B of investment in WA with \$132.8 million allocated for the Great Northern Highway Corridor. Along with \$1.7B for Metronet, this is the Great Northern Corridors is the only other highlighted initiative for WA. The following is a summary of this initiative.

#### Projects within the Great Northern Highway Corridor:

#### Great Northern Highway - Brooking Channel Bridge

The project will upgrade the Great Northern Highway with construction of a two-lane bridge over the Brooking Channel at Fitzroy Crossing, improving the resilience of the Great Northern Highway in the Kimberley region.

#### Great Northern Highway – Fitzroy to Gogo (Kimberley Resilience Program)

The project will deliver 11 kilometres of road reconstruction and replacement of two single lane bridges along the Great Northern Highway Fitzroy Crossing to Gogo Section to ensure continued improvement in social and economic outcomes for First Nations people of Fitzroy Crossing.

#### Port Hedland Airport Deviation

The project will construct a five-kilometre single carriageway to realign the Great Northern Highway away from the Port Hedland International Airport, construct a single-span concrete road bridge over a duplicated rail line, construct two access roads and relocate a tourist information bay.

#### Great Northern Highway - Broome to Kununurra (Nellie Springs to Sally Downs Well and Arthur Creek)

The project will upgrade the Great Northern Highway by replacing a single lane bridge with a two-lane bridge at Arthur Creek, and upgrading four floodways' to bridges between Nellie Springs and Sally Downs Well.

#### Great Northern Highway Upgrade Ord River North Section (Stage 2)

The project will widen and overlay 11.2 kilometres of road along the Great Northern Highway and construct a new bridge over Tickalara Creek including approach works and removal of the existing bridge.

#### Great Northern Highway Upgrade - Ord River North Section, Stage 3

The project will comprise of two stages:

- Stage 3a: includes widening and overlay, reconstruction, and realignment of the Great Northern Highway, replacing and extending culverts, improving off-road drainage, and constructing road safety barriers as required.
- Stage 3b: includes widening and overlay, reconstruction and realignment of the Great Northern Highway, construction of a north bound passing lane and new bridge over Frog Hollow.

#### Great Northern Highway Upgrade - Newman to Port Hedland Overtaking Lanes

The project will construct up to 18 high priority overtaking lanes along Great Northern Highway from Newman to Port Hedland.

### Great Northern Highway Upgrade – Broome to Kununurra (Deep Creek, Logue River and Wonjil)

The project involves upgrading approximately 33 kilometres of the Great Northern Highway between Roebuck and Fitzroy Crossing, including rehabilitation, and widening of existing pavement on various sections, improvements to the road formation and drainage, construction of a heavy vehicle parking bay and road signs, safety barriers and road marking.

- They are interested in a new approach to invest in the region, piloting this in the Kimberley, which
  is not a project-based investment approach, but presents a collective staged investment plan to

## **Purpose**

To note that a submission was lodged by the KRG into the House of Representatives Standing Committee on Regional Development, Infrastructure and Transport Inquiry into Local Government Sustainability.

#### In summary

- The House of Representatives Standing Committee on Regional Development, Infrastructure and Transport has been tasked to inquire into and report on local government sustainability.
- The inquiry was adopted on 21 March 2024 following a referral from the Minister for Infrastructure, Transport, Regional Development and Local Government, the Hon Catherine King MP.
- The Committee sought written submissions by 31 May 2024.
- It was agreed via an out of session discussion with the KRG Chair and secretariat that the KRG should lodge a submission raising sustainability issues and solutions.
- At the April 2024 meeting KRG members endorsed the proposed framework for the submission, agreed to provide case studies and noted that the submission would be circulated out of session for endorsement.
  - Both a draft and final submission were circulated out of session by the Executive Team for their input prior to lodging the submission.
- Advice has been sought from the Committee on the location of public hearings and the timeframe to publish their report.

## **Background**

The Committee terms of reference are as follows:

The House of Representatives Standing Committee on Regional Development, Infrastructure and Transport will inquire into and report on local government matters, with a particular focus on:

- The financial sustainability and funding of local government
- The changing infrastructure and service delivery obligations of local government
- Any structural impediments to security for local government workers and infrastructure and service delivery
- Trends in the attraction and retention of a skilled workforce in the local government sector, including impacts of labour hire practices
- The role of the Australian Government in addressing issues raised in relation to the above
- Other relevant issues.

## **Purpose**

To provide regional crime trend data to inform advocacy.

#### In summary

- The KRG Priority Action Plan lists community safety and crime prevention and juvenile justice as a priority action area, with the presentation of regional crime statistics and trends at each KRG meeting.
- There are no Kimberley regional statistics on the WA Police website.
- 2023/24 trend data is presented for Kimberley towns including the type of crime per month
- These statistics are raw data with no data analysis.

## **Background**

- WA Police Crime statistics are updated onto the WA Police website on a quarterly basis in the last week of January, April, July and October, noting that offence count data is subject to revision as police investigations may not be finalised at the time the data is published.
- The crime statistics are reported based on the location the offence occurred.
- It must be noted that crime statistics may be influenced by a wide range of factors; including, but not limited to, population size, infrastructure (such as shopping centres and entertainment precincts), seasonal trends, and the extent to which crime is reported to or detected by police. Consideration should be given to factors influencing crime when interpreting statistics.

#### **Details**

The trend data shows a spike in crime over the Christmas/New year holiday period in most towns. Data indicates that the major offence across the Kimberley is Assault (Family).

The Kimberley has the highest rates of Family and Domestic Violence (FDV) offences across Western Australia, with reports that family violence rates are up almost 50 per cent in five years.

Other key offences include stealing, property damage, dwelling burglary and breaches of violence restraining orders. Broome has fraud and related offenses that are not seen in other towns, apart from Kununurra which is at a lower percentage. The key difference between the Kimberley and the regional statistics relates to graffiti and drug offences

#### Key issues raised

- Dedicated Ministerial team working with the KRG (Model similar to that used to upgrade Fitzroy Crossing Bridge) raised by Cr. Geoff Haerewa and taken on notice by Premier who will give it further thought. Minister Punch said that the model used in the Greater Bunbury Area around planning could be one to replicate and that he would provide information.
- First Port of Entry (FPOE) Cr Tony Chafer raised FPOE requirements and the need for the State Government to commit an infrastructure budget for Port of Wyndham upgrades before proceeding with a new FPOE application to the Federal Government.

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- Upgrade of the Great Northern Highway Minister Saffioti indicated that it is a long program of planning and construction of dual lane bridges that they are committed to. Planning for Willare Bridge will commence soon.
- Housing Minister Carey did not discuss anything new in terms of housing. Minister Rita Saffioti indicated that they are reviewing the State Government market-led proposal assessment process.
- Youth crime and low school attendance rate Minister Buti did not discuss anything new in terms of education. Minister Papalia committed to continuing Operational Regional Shield.
- Funding for businesses –increasing REDS Grants Pool and State Government partner with NAIF to offer a small loans scheme (similar to what the Northern Territory is doing). Minister Punch did not commit to increasing REDS and Minister Cook indicated that they are investigating the NAIF option. DPIRD have put a consultant onto this.
- Liquor restrictions raised by Cr Tony Chafer Liquor Accord wanting to have a 2L cask option instead of glass wine bottles. Minister Paul Papalia indicated that he is in favour of reducing the days in the week for sale of alcohol (e.g. currently being assessed in Derby).
- State Government contracts not going to local organisations East Kimberley of Chamber and Industry raised recent Kimberley Small Business Support contract going to Business Foundations (Fremantle based). Premier took the question on notice.
- Childcare –Premier reiterated he understood the importance of childcare and they are working with the Commonwealth.
- Banking Minister Punch committed to raising the reduced banking services in the East Kimberley at his next meeting with Bankwest/CommBank.

In addition, David Menzel and Geoff Haerewa had dinner with Ministers Punch and Minister Papalia.

# President's Report July 2024

#### Introduction

As always, I am proud to highlight our continual efforts, to influence Government and support our Members through advocacy, expertise, and opportunities for connection.

#### Waste and Environment Summit

On Thursday, 30 May and Friday, 31 May, over 70 delegates gathered in Northam to discuss the key waste and environment challenges and solutions for the Wheatbelt region.

Now in its sixth year, the Summit brings together Local Government, State Government, businesses and the community for key speaker presentations, workshops, panel discussions, and a tour of Northam's key waste and environment locations.

Speakers included the Hon Darren West, Parliamentary Secretary to the Minister for Energy; Environment; Climate Action and representatives from the Departments of Primary Industries and Regional Development and Water and Environmental Regulation. A key takeaway was the need for effective regional collaboration and the opportunities for further cooperation with businesses and Local Government.

The Waste and Environment Summit highlights how our people are proactive, passionate, and committed to providing the support Local Governments need to best serve their local communities.

#### Inquiry into Local Government Sustainability - Public Hearing

On Friday, 7 June I joined WALGA CEO Nick Sloan and Economist Dan Thompson in representing the sector to the Standing Committee on Regional Development, Infrastructure and Transport's public hearing for their <u>inquiry into local government</u> sustainability.

This was a valuable opportunity to speak directly to the members of the Committee and highlight the important role that Local Governments play in providing community infrastructure and services as well as the ongoing challenges in raising revenue to meet community needs.

I would also like to thank those Local Governments that have made a submission to the Inquiry.

#### Submissions to Regional Telecommunications Reviews and Inquiries

WALGA provided submissions to the National 2024 Regional Telecommunications Review and the State Parliament Public Administration Committee Inquiry into Regional Telecommunications in Western Australia based on endorsed advocacy positions, items raised at Zone meetings and feedback from Local Governments.

All regional and peri-urban Local Governments were invited to provide information for the WALGA submission and to make submissions directly.



#### 2024 Federal and State Budgets

The WALGA Advocacy and Policy teams assembled on the State and Federal budget nights in May to provide analysis for our Member Councils and the public more broadly through our website.

It was disappointing that despite our extensive advocacy and positive feedback received from within Government, there was limited support for priorities identified in WALGA's State Budget Submission such as more funding for bushfire volunteers and Community Emergency Services Managers (CESMs), the renewal of aging libraries, upgrade of arts and cultural facilities and funding to address coastal erosion.

On behalf of our Member Councils, WALGA will continue to advocate strongly for areas we had previously identified, as part of our 2025 Election Policy Platform and Campaign.

#### National Reconciliation Week

National Reconciliation Week (NRW) is a time for all Australians to learn about our shared histories, cultures, and achievements and explore how each of us can contribute to reconciliation in Australia.

WALGA was proud to partner once again with Reconciliation WA to deliver a full program of events across the State. Highlights included the high-profile NRW Breakfast, Reconciliation Memoirs with Carol Innes AM, and many of our WALGA Staff attending the Walk for Reconciliation at Langley Park.

Thank you to all Member Councils and Elected Members who supported this important cause. Reconciliation is important, now more than ever.

#### Polyphagous Shot-hole Borer

The Polyphagous Shot-hole Borer (PSBH) biosecurity emergency facing Western Australia is at a critical tipping point. With no current effective treatment more than 3,000 mature trees have so far been removed. Many of these are located in the most iconic and important areas of Perth, including Kings Park, Rottnest Island, Perth Zoo, Hyde Park and around Lake Claremont.

WALGA recently convened a roundtable attended by DPIRD and Local Government CEOs from across the PSHB quarantine area. It was clear from the discussion that without an urgent and substantial increase in resourcing and escalation of the response PSHB is unlikely to be eradicated, or even contained, which would decimate our urban tree canopy and put agricultural crops like avocado and citrus at risk. It is essential that a PSHB recovery plan is developed now.

I have written to the Premier seeking an urgent meeting on this issue, and last week met with the Minister for the Environment to voice our concerns.

#### Local Government Legislative Reform

The Minister for Local Government has advised that it is intended to introduce a Bill to Parliament this year for the tranche two reforms.

Tranche two reforms include:

- the new Local Government Inspector
- introduction of monitors for early intervention
- council member superannuation



- increasing penalties
- enabling resource sharing
- streamlining processes for model local laws
- greater role clarity for council members and CEOs
- introduction of a rates and revenue policy for Local Governments
- changes to audit committees to require an Independent Chair
- building upgrade finance.

Information about tranche two reforms will be provided to the sector as soon as appropriate, via webinars, LG alerts and other opportunities as they arise.

#### Media Activity

As President, I held a number of interviews during this period, particularly on urban canopy and the WALGA greening grants, housing, changes to long service leave laws, and the Salaries and Allowances tribunal changes.

## Department of Local Government, Sport and Cultural Industries Report

June 2024

#### Local Government Act Reform

#### Tranche 1

- The Local Government Amendment Act 2023, containing the first tranche of reforms, was passed on 11 May 2023 and included priority reforms to election and council representation ahead of the October 2023 Local Government Elections.
- The electoral reforms included the introduction of optional preferential voting, changes to council member representation based on population, and abolishing the use of wards for smaller local governments.
- Tranche one reforms that were implemented without the need for further regulations included:
  - o changes to special electors' meetings
  - o compliance exemptions (due to emergency or unusual circumstances)
  - parental leave for council members
  - recording individual votes in minutes of council meetings.
- Three regulation amendments and 63 Governor's Orders were made in 2023 to prescribe detail related to reforms. These included:
  - o model financial statements
  - constitutional reforms such as the introduction of class groupings and the alignment of council sizes to population size
  - electoral reforms such as optional preferential voting, backfilling and the public election of mayors and presidents
  - o remuneration for independent committee members
  - o broadcasting and recording of council meetings
  - owners and occupiers' enrolments
  - payment for council professional development and training.
- Various other regulations projects are currently in development or being drafted. These include:
  - standardised meeting procedures
  - o council plans
  - o community engagement charters
  - community surveys
  - o online registers
  - o publication of CEO key performance indicators
  - o communications agreements
  - standardisation of crossovers and incidental outdoor trading.



- The DLGSC provides regular updates to the local government sector on the progress of reforms via DLGSC's Reform webinar series, updates to the DLGSC website and LG alerts.
- A three-month consultation process is currently being undertaken to inform the drafting of standardised meeting procedures in regulations.
- The consultation opened on 28 February 2024 and finishes on 29 May 2024.
- As of 23 May 2024, DLGSC has received 102 responses.
- All local governments, council members, local government CEOs, local government employees and community members are encouraged to make a submission.

#### Tranche 2

- It is intended to introduce a Bill to Parliament this year for tranche two reforms.
- · Tranche two reforms include:
  - o the new Local Government Inspector
  - introduction of monitors for early intervention
  - council member superannuation
  - o increasing penalties
  - enabling resource sharing
  - streamlining processes for model local laws
  - greater role clarity for council members and CEOs
  - o introduction of a rates and revenue policy for local governments
  - o changes to audit committees
  - building upgrade finance.
- Information about tranche two reforms will be provided to the sector as soon as appropriate, via webinars, LG alerts and other opportunities as they arise.

#### Long Service Leave Regulations

- The Local Government (Long Service Leave) Regulations 2024 were published on Wednesday 17 April 2024 and will come into effect on 1 September 2024.
- The Regulations have been made to modernise long service leave arrangements for employees working in the local government sector.
- The previous Regulations and corresponding industrial relations scheme had not been substantially updated since their introduction in the 1970s.
- The new Regulations will improve the operation of the local government long service leave portability scheme, which is an integral part of local government employment conditions. This means that when staff change employment from one local government to another, all their service in the local government sector counts towards their accrual of long service leave.
- The new Regulations introduce changes intended to strengthen the system of long service leave entitlements for local government employees, including:
  - a longer permitted period of break between local government sector employers that maintain continuity of service
  - period of parental leave where the employee is being paid by the Commonwealth will count towards long service leave accrual
  - employees can negotiate taking advanced long service leave and cashing out of long service leave with their employer.



- The DLGSC held a webinar on 30 April 2024 to explain the changes and answer questions.
- The webinar recording is available on DLGSC's website.
- More information about the Regulations is available on DLGSC's website.

#### Model Financial Statements (MFS) and Financial

- Model Financial Statements (MFS) guidelines and templates for Class 1 and 2, plus a reduced version for smaller local governments (Class 3 and 4) were published on the DLGSC website on 16 May 2023 and applied to 2022-23 annual financial statements.
- A first tranche of regulatory amendments for the MFS commenced on 1 July 2022.
- A second tranche of regulatory amendments for the MFS commenced on 1 July 2023.
- The 1 September 2023 version of the Local Government (Financial Management) Regulations 1996 includes the new credit card regulation 13A.
- On 19 October 2023, an LG Alert was issued, which also provided guidance on reporting credit card and purchasing card transactions.
- An LG Alert was issued on 9 January 2024 seeking feedback on the MFS used for 2022-23 annual financial statements report.
- Feedback closed on 9 February 2024 and was reviewed prior to updating the model financial statements for 2023-24. The updated MFS for 2023-24 annual financial statements report will be published early June 2024.
- Non-financial asset valuation guidelines are currently being prepared. A draft was
  presented to a sector body workshop held on 22 March 2024, and feedback is being
  addressed with a view to finalise and publish t by the end of June 2024.

#### **Local Government Grants Commission**

- The WA Local Government Grants Commission (the Commission) has five member and deputy positions with terms that end on 31 August 2024, work has progressed for nominations.
- On 15 April 2024, the Commission Chairperson Cr Dan Bull was preselected as the WA Labor Candidate for Maylands in the 2025 State Election and has therefore resigned as chair from the Commission.
- The Chairperson and the deputy position of Deputy to the Deputy Chairperson are vacant and will be filled in 2024.
- The total amount of 2023-24 Financial Assistance Grants (FA Grants) was \$393,675,581 (\$366,684,564 paid in advance). This was made up of two components:
  - \$241,099,199 for General Purpose Grants (\$230,921,687 paid in advance), and
  - \$152,576,382 for Local Roads Grants (\$135,762,877 paid in advance).
- An advance payment of the 2023-24 FA Grants, based on a funding pool equivalent to approximately 100% of the total 2023-24 funding pool, was made to local governments on the 30 June 2023.



- Local Governments were advised that the advance payment meant remaining payments during 2023-24 would be limited and that they needed to ensure they have sufficient funds for 2023-24 to complete their planned programs.
- Due to the 100% advance, all WA local governments were either over or underpaid, with the difference to be recouped from their future 2024-25 funding. All local governments with a variance of \$50,000, or greater than 2% of rates revenue, have been advised of the implications to next year's allocations.
- The Commission completed a visiting program to the Pilbara in order to conduct public hearings in October 2023, further visited nine local governments in the Upper Great Southern and Eastern Goldfields-South regions in April 2024 and recently visited four local governments in the Kimberley region in May 2024.
- The Commission is currently working on indicative funding allocations for the 2024-25 FA Grants, with the possible advance payment of 75% likely to be made in late June 2024 by the Commonwealth Government.

#### Stop Puppy Farming

- The State Government is delivering on its commitment to stop and prevent puppy farming. These reforms have overwhelming community support.
- The Dog Amendment (Stop Puppy Farming) Act 2021 requires the design and development of a centralised registration system (CRS) for dogs and cats.
- The CRS will also assist with the registration of cats under the Cat Act 2011, and the
  development of regulations, in consultation with stakeholders.
- The DLGSC concluded a Design and Discovery phase for the CRS on 18 March 2024.
- DLGSC is continuing to engage local governments and other key stakeholders across the State to prepare for CRS implementation.
- Public consultation on the proposed regulations closed late last year, and the final regulations are in development.
- The Department of Local Government, Sport and Cultural Industries has undertaken targeted consultation with local governments about the implementation of the stop puppy farming legislation.

#### **Off Road Vehicles**

- · ORV committee are continuing to meet regularly.
- A private proponent is currently investigating the potential of an ORV area south of Perth.
- The government has invested \$100,000 to improve the ORV areas, specifically in York and Ledge Point.
- Upgrades at other sites are in the pipeline, as the search continues to expand Western Australia's ORV network.
- The future of Pinjar's ORV site was assured when the government decided to end pine harvesting in the Gnangara State Forest, to preserve the roosting habitat of the endangered black cockatoo and support the recreational use of the area.
- A safety assessment has been conducted at the Lancelin ORV area, within the Shire of Gingin with the final report to be delivered before the end of the financial year.



#### **Local Government Election Commitments**

- The City of Bayswater's Riverside Gardens Urban Development project is on track.
   Detailed design is expected to be completed in June 2024, with an estimated project cost to be known at this time.
- The City of Gosnells' Sutherlands Park Youth (Skate) Plaza is on track. Detailed design
  is complete, and a contractor appointed for design and construction. Civil works are
  underway with main works commencing in August 2024 with expected completion in
  January 2025.
- The City of Joondalup's Greenwood Scout and Guide Hall Refurbishment project is on track with construction underway and due for completion in November 2024
- The City of Swan's Ellenbrook Community Hub project has completed community consultation and a detailed needs analysis. The City is currently finalising the detailed design to a 50 per cent brief by August 2024.

#### Ratability of Misc Licenses

- The State Administrative Tribunal (SAT) has recently determined that land subject to a
  Miscellaneous License is not subject to local government rates under any.
  circumstances.
- The DLGSC has already issued an LG alert to warn regional local governments of this issue.
- The DLGSC is also preparing to consult with regional areas to identify whether any local governments have been charging rates over miscellaneous licenses or intended to do so.
- The intention of the consultation is to quantify the potential financial impact that this SAT decision has had on the sector.
- The DLGSC has been advised that the local government involved in the SAT decision is intending to appeal that decision, on the grounds that it contains errors of law.

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# 6. WALGA's efforts to become an employer Organisation

#### **Item For Noting**

Submitted by: Tony Brown, Executive Director, Member Services,

#### **EXECUTIVE SUMMARY**

- As previously detailed in an item to all Zones in April, WALGA has been considering amending the Association Constitution to enable WALGA to become a registered employer organisation under section 54 of the *Industrial Relations Act 1979* (WA) (IR Act).
- Despite advocacy efforts by WALGA since December 2022, the State Government has not agreed a pathway for WALGA to be provided with standing as an employer organisation by being named in the IR Act.
- Becoming an employer organisation would provide WALGA with more opportunity to modernise the Local Government State Awards, intervene in industrial matters concerning the Local Government sector, and generally better represent Members' views.
- Whilst the benefits of becoming an employer organisation are considerable, legal advice received by WALGA suggests that the constitutional amendments necessary for WALGA to comply with the requirements for registration are considerable and unachievable without wholesale changes to the governance structure of the Association.
- WALGA will continue to advocate to the State Government for WALGA to be named in the IR
  Act and given the status of an employer organisation, without needing to make constitutional
  amendments.

#### **POLICY IMPLICATIONS**

The existing <u>Advocacy Position</u> on WALGA's registration as an Employee Organisation is contained in position 2.8.3:

That WALGA advocate for amendments to the Industrial Relations Act 1979 (WA) (IR Act) for WALGA to be named in the IR Act like the Western Australian Branch of the Australian Medical Association Incorporated (AMA) at s.72B and given the status of an employer organisation, including to the Minister for Industrial Relations, the Minister for Local Government and the Department of Mines, Industry Regulation and Safety.

#### **BACKGROUND**

Currently, WALGA is a registered industrial agent under the <u>Industrial Relations Act 1979 (WA)</u> (IR Act). This status allows WALGA to:

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- appear as an agent for a WA Local Government or Regional Council in the Western Australian Industrial Relations Commission (WAIRC) and Industrial Magistrate's Court or Industrial Appeal Court; and
- provide advice or other services to Local Governments in relation to 'industrial matters' as
  defined in section 7 of the IR Act.

Since the mandate for Local Governments<sup>1</sup> to operate in the State industrial relations system from 1 January 2023, unions have commenced various Local Government State awards variation claims in the WAIRC to amend industry employment conditions.

Currently, WALGA can intervene in award matters, but is unable to represent named employers and the broader Local Government sector in its own right.

WALGA has been advocating to the State Government since late 2022 to amend the IR Act and name WALGA as an employer organisation in the Act. These advocacy efforts have been unsuccessful to date.

Without being named in the IR Act, WALGA would need to comply with strict governance requirements to apply to become an employer organisation. This would require significant amendments to the Association Constitution, as well as endorsement by State Council and Members.

Even if these constitutional amendments were made and an application supported by State Council and the membership, the ultimate decision as to whether or not to register WALGA as an employer organisation rests with the WAIRC.

#### COMMENT

As foreshadowed in an Agenda item to Zones in April, WALGA has been looking to amend the Association Constitution to enable WALGA to apply to become a registered employer organisation under the IR Act.

WALGA has recently engaged lawyers, Jackson McDonald, to provide legal advice as to what constitutional amendments must be made to ensure WALGA is best placed to make a successful application for registration.

The advice received indicates that the changes required would be substantial, costly and potentially unwieldy, involving significant changes to the current governance structure and election processes of WALGA.

In particular, the following three changes required under the IR Act are considered to be untenable with the current structure of WALGA, and would therefore prohibit the Association from making a successful application for registration:

with the exception of the Shires of Christmas Island and Cocos (Keeling) Islands	
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#### 1. Secret Postal Ballot

Section 56 of the IR Act requires that elections for the holder of each office within the organisation <u>must</u> be conducted by way of secret postal ballot. Due to the broad definition of "office" and "officer" in the IR Act, WALGA office holders include every State Council representative, as well as the President and Deputy President.

Whilst conducting the elections for President and Deputy President via a secret postal ballot would be achievable, a postal voting system for the election of State Council representatives by Zone Delegates across 17 Zones would be unmanageable. As well as timing issues (see below), there would be significant costs involved in conducting elections in this manner, with no benefit to Members.

To accommodate an election of State Council representatives by secret postal ballot, the election cycle of WALGA would need to be changed. Currently, the terms of State Councillors run from the day of the first Ordinary State Council meeting immediately following the biennial Local Government elections (being the first week of December), to the day before the first Ordinary State Council meeting immediately following the next Local Government elections (2 years later). To allow for sufficient time for an election by postal ballot (an unavoidably slow process), the terms for State Councillors would need to be amended to commence at the next meeting (being March the year following the Local Government elections). In the meantime, the composition of State Council would be subject to the results of the Local Government elections (which may result in vacancies, with representatives needing to leave their State Council position due to no longer being on Council).

#### 2. Independent Returning Officer

Section 56 of the IR Act requires that the rules of an employer organisation <u>must</u> provide for the conduct of every election to an office within the organisation by an independent returning officer, not being the holder of any other office in, and not being an employee of, the organisation. As described above, WALGA office holders include the President, Deputy President and State Councillors.

An independent returning officer could be engaged relatively easily for the election of President and Deputy President. However, engaging independent returning officers to conduct the election of State Council representatives at all 17 Zone meetings in the weeks following the biennial Local Government elections raises significant concerns in terms of cost, administrative burden and timing.

At present, the State Council elections are conducted in mid-November, about 4-5 weeks after the Local Government elections. In the interim, Councils are required to meet and elect or appoint their Zone Delegates. This leaves very little time for an independent returning officer to carry out a formal nomination and election process.

This difficulty would only be compounded if the postal voting requirement were also adopted for State Council elections.

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The Commissioner <u>must</u> refuse an application for registration if they are not satisfied that the rules conform with the election requirements in section 56 (including secret postal ballot and independent returning officer).

#### 3. Secretary

The IR Act requires the creation of a position of "Secretary". Under the current governance structure of WALGA, the functions of Secretary are held by the CEO. However, under the IR Act, the Secretary is considered an "office", meaning it is subject to the same election requirements as other offices. Therefore, on a strict view, the Secretary should be the President, Deputy President or a State Councillor, not the CEO.

Once again, this is a significant non-compliance risk that jeopardises the likelihood of WALGA's application for registration being successful.

#### **NEXT STEPS**

For the reasons described above, it is proposed that WALGA <u>does not proceed</u> with the original plan to amend the Association Constitution and apply for registration as an employer organisation under the IR Act.

Instead WALGA has the following options to seek standing to become a registered organisation of employers under the IR Act:

- 1. Option 1 Advocate to the Minister for Industrial Relations to either:
  - name WALGA in the IR Act as an employer organisation similar to the Western Australian Branch of the Australian Medical Association Incorporated under s. 72B; or
  - b. amend the IR Act provision to permit WALGA to register as an employer organisation without making modifications to its Constitution or governance model. This might be achieved by amending the provisions to permit dual registration of organisations or making modifications to the election procedures of organisations.
- 2. Option 2 Establish a new entity to apply for registration as an organisation of employers which will require separate management/committee, a motion approving an application for registration to the WAIRC under s. 54 of the IR Act and a Constitution which complies with all aspects of Part II, Division 4 of the IR Act.
- 3. Option 3 In the event that neither Option 1 or 2 are achieved or considered appropriate, the final option will be for WALGA to establish protocols with Member Local Governments to notify WALGA when new union claims are made and to work with Members to bring award variations in the names of Local Governments.

WALGA met with the Minister for Industrial Relations, Hon Simone McGurk MLA, on 13 June to again advocate for WALGA to be named in the IR Act. The importance of WALGA becoming an employer organisation was discussed, alongside the complexities of amending the Association Constitution to adhere to IR Act registration requirements (as detailed above).

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WALGA will keep the Zones updated on any progress on this item.

#### **BACKGROUND**

The Local Emergency Management Committee (**LEMC**) is established by Council under section 38 of the *Emergency Management Act 2005* (**Act**). In accordance with section 39 of the Act, the functions of the LEMC are:

- a. to advise and assist the local government in assuring that local emergency management arrangements are established for its district;
- b. to liaise with public authorities and other persons in the development, review and testing of local emergency management arrangements; and
- c. to carry out other emergency management activities as directed by the State Emergency Management Committee, or prescribed by the *Emergency Management Regulations 2006*.

The Shire of Derby/West Kimberley Local Emergency Management Terms of Reference was adopted at the Ordinary Council Meeting held on Thursday, 26 October 2023.

#### STATUTORY ENVIRONMENT

#### **Emergency Management Act 2005**

Section 36. Functions of local government

It is a function of a local government:

- a. subject to this Act, to ensure that effective local emergency management arrangements are prepared and maintained for its district;
- b. to manage recovery following an emergency affecting the community in its district; and
- c. to perform other functions given to the local government under this Act.

#### 38 Local emergency management committees

- 1. A local government is to establish one or more local emergency management committees for the local government's district.
- 2. If more than one local emergency management committee is established, the local government is to specify the area in respect of which the committee is to exercise its functions.
- 3. A local emergency management committee consists of:
  - a. a chairman and other members appointed by the relevant local government in accordance with subsection (4); and
  - b. if the local emergency coordinator is not appointed as chairman of the committee, the local emergency coordinator for the local government district.
- 4. Subject to this section, the constitution and procedures of a local emergency management committee, and the terms and conditions of appointment of members, are to be determined by the SEMC.

#### 39 Functions of local emergency management committees

The functions of a local emergency management committee are, in relation to its district or the area for which it is established:

- a. to advise and assist the local government in ensuring that local emergency management arrangements are established for its district;
- b. to liaise with public authorities and other persons in the development, review and testing of local emergency management arrangements; and
- c. to carry out other emergency management activities as directed by the SEMC or prescribed by the regulations.

#### Section 41 Emergency management arrangements in local government district

- 1. A local government is to ensure that arrangements (local emergency management arrangements) for emergency management in the local government's district are prepared.
- 2. The local emergency management arrangements are to set out:
  - a. the local government's policies for emergency management;
  - b. the roles and responsibilities of public authorities and other persons involved in emergency management in the local government district;

- c. provisions about the coordination of emergency operations and activities relating to emergency management performed by the persons mentioned in paragraph (b);
  - i.(d) a description of emergencies that are likely to occur in the local government district;
  - ii. (e) strategies and priorities for emergency management in the local government district;
  - iii. (f) other matters about emergency management in the local government district prescribed by the regulations; and
  - iv. (g) other matters about emergency management in the local government district the local government considers appropriate.
- 3. Local emergency management arrangements are to be consistent with the State emergency management policies and State emergency management plans.
- 4. Local emergency management arrangements are to include a recovery plan and the nomination of a local recovery coordinator.
- 5. A local government is to deliver a copy of its local emergency management arrangements, and any amendment to the arrangements, to the SEMC as soon as is practicable after they are prepared.

#### Section 42 Reviewing and renewing local emergency management arrangements

- 1. local government is to ensure that its local emergency management arrangements are reviewed in accordance with the procedures established by the SEMC.
- 2. Local emergency management arrangements may be amended or replaced whenever the local government considers it appropriate.

#### Section 43 Local emergency management arrangements to be available for inspection

- 1. A local government is to keep a copy of its local emergency management arrangements at the offices of the local government.
- 2. The arrangements are to be available for inspection, free of charge, by members of the public during office hours.
- 3. The arrangements may be made available in written or electronic form.

- 4.2 The emergency management arrangements and local recovery plan has been signed off by all parties and been forwarded to DFES to be registered at State level.
- 4.3 Verge collection pre-wet season have been completed for most areas for the town of Derby and Fitzroy Crossing.

#### 5. NEW BUSINESS

5.1 The importance of this committee and attending in person if possible was raised. The relationships that were built during COVID-19 and during the flood period allowed the response to occur the way it did where all agencies worked with each other fairly well. That

was mostly on the understanding that the relationships were built on the basis of everyone getting to know each other as an agency, but also as a person. Building these relationships moving forward allow us to provide a better response across the Shire and the Kimberley as a whole.

- 5.2 Coming into fire season, the Shire will mail information out to all stakeholders in the near future. A few places on Shire land has also been identified as areas where a few new firebreaks can be added in to help protect local assets.
- 5.3 Update on rubbish: Still have some waste out on Loch Street and an application has been put into Main Roads to approve the traffic application for collection. It is anticipated that this should be cleared by the end of the week. All of the other waste around the town has been removed. Cleanaway has assured the Shire that this will not happen again.
  - Derby Volunteer Rescue Group has just voted in some new members. Currently focusing on training.
- 5.4 Introduction to the new representative, Grant Pilgram, from the Department of Communities. Evacuation Centre training will occur shortly and information on this will be sent out shortly.
- 5.5 Request for the timing of the meeting to be extended by 30 60 minutes to allow those committee members residing in Broome to be able to attend meetings in person.
- 5.6 Defence is starting its exercise period for 2024.
- 5.7 Horizon Power has completed all vegetation control around its assets in Fitzroy, Camballin and Looma (tree cutting) and the line corridor slashing in Derby and the rural areas. Horizon Power is also halfway through tree cutting away from the power lines which should be completed in the next 1-2 weeks
- 5.8 Update that there are two working groups that have been established. One is the local emergency management arrangements improvement program (WA Local Government and DFES) that will be looking at our LEMA policies and procedures. The second is the state recovery framework review that has been established with DFES with the Shire representatives on both of the working groups. Will also working t establishing a sub-group LEMC for Fitzroy Crossing.
- 5.9 Update on the changes that are coming to the Australian Warning System. This will be particularly relevant for the upcoming wet season as we will see the removal of the blue, yellow and red alert system that is currently used for cyclones. The new system will bring in some consistent messaging with what is currently used for bushfires levels and to bring it in line with other States across the country. The implementation date has been scheduled for the 15 July 2024 and there is online awareness training that has been developed.

If this arrangement is accepted by Council, the Senior Management Group will develop a contingency plan to ensure essential services are adequately delivered to the community and suitable public notice regarding closures will be provided to minimise any inconvenience.

Apart from normal Public Holiday arrangements, staff take the intervening days as Annual Leave, or if available, Time in Lieu or Leave Without Pay. The employee may only return to work to carry out set tasks as negotiated with their Director/Manager.

The Derby and Fitzroy Crossing waste management facilities are managed by a third party and are closed on Christmas Day. Accordingly, no kerbside collection occurs, on Christmas Day (this is a contractual arrangement).

This item sets out proposed dates for the 2025 calendar year, taking into consideration other relevant commitments of the Council. It also invites Council to consider allocating if it wished to have any of its meetings held using electronic means.

#### **BACKGROUND**

Every Western Australian local government is required to give local public notice of the dates, times and places at which their Ordinary Council Meetings and their Committee Meetings (that are open to the public) are to be held for the next 12 months.

#### **Ordinary Council Meeting:**

At the October 2023 Ordinary Council Meeting, Council determined its meeting dates for the 2024 calendar year. Consideration of the meeting dates for the next 12 months (2024) in accordance with the *Local Government (Administration) Regulations 1996* is now required.

New requirements around "electronic meetings" attendance at meetings by electronic means which were introduced in 2023 Council. It resolved to "consider at the time of setting future Council/Committee Meeting Schedule, whether to allocate any of those meetings (up to the 50% cap) as electronic meetings".

#### STATUTORY ENVIRONMENT

**Local Government (Administration) Regulations 1996 – Regulation 12 (Publication of meeting details)** outlines that at least once each year local public notice of the dates, times, and places at which ordinary council, and committee meetings that are required to be open to the public, are to be held in the next 12 months.

**Local Government (Administration) Regulations 1996 – 14D (Meetings held by electronic means)** outlines that Council can determine that up to a maximum of 50% of its Council meetings, and its Committee meetings that are required to be open to the public, be held by electronic means.

The cost of advertising is estimated at \$500.

#### **CONSULTATION**

Once dates are approved by Council, they will be advertised throughout the Shire in accordance with the requirements of the Local Government Act. There is no need for public consultation to occur in addition to the above.

#### COMMENT

It is recommended that Council continue holding its Ordinary Meetings of Council on the last Thursday of each month (excluding January when Council is in recess). In accordance with Council's Policy – C5 Council Meetings – Date, Time and Venue, eight meetings are scheduled to be held in Derby and three in Fitzroy Crossing (March, September and November). Once adopted by Council, Officers will advertise this information to the public by way of public notices as per statutory regulations, and to upload to the Shire's website.

With regard to the December 2025 meeting, it is proposed to hold the Audit & Risk Committee Meeting on Tuesday, 9 December 2025 and the Ordinary Council Meeting on Thursday, 11 December 2025, as opposed to the usual schedule to ensure availability of Elected Members in the Christmas holiday period.

Meeting dates are not impacted by the Easter holiday period for 2025.

**Audit & Risk Committee Meeting:** Council has usually held quarterly Audit meetings mid-month (i.e. two weeks prior to the Ordinary Council Meeting). The Committee currently has a membership of five Councillors and an independent person, and the Terms of Reference for the Committee are attached to this item. The purpose of the Committee is to facilitate:

• Compliance with laws and regulations with reference to best practice guidelines relative to auditing, risk management, internal control and legislative compliance;

- The provision of an effective means of communication between the external auditor, the CEO and the Council;
- Integrated Planning review and adoption;
- Policy review and adoption; and
- Upon request of the Council, other matters with potential impact on finances, resources, strategic direction and policy of the Shire.

The Audit & Risk Committee meeting can be attended by all Elected Members.

It is suggested that the Audit & Risk Committee Meetings be held on the third Thursday of the month, one week prior to the Ordinary Council Meeting on a quarterly basis.

Agenda Review, Briefings and Forums/Workshops: This meeting is to allow for Administration to present to Council Members on upcoming topics and considerations and for Council Members to seek clarification and ask questions. The meeting is bound by the same requirements regarding declarations and interests but does not make decisions and can be attended by all Council Members.

The Agenda Review, Briefing and Forum Meetings in 2024 were held on the second Thursday of each month. It is recommended that no changes be made to the schedule in 2025 and the Agenda Review, Briefing and Forum/Workshop Meetings remain to be held on the second Thursday of each Month (excluding January when Council is in recess).

Below are the annual events that are appropriate to be taken into consideration when adopting Council Meeting dates for the 2025 calendar year. Most dates will not interfere with Council's traditional meeting dates (i.e. last Thursday of each month).

#### 13.5 DERBY AIRPORT - REGULAR PASSENGER TRANSPORT SERVICE SUBSIDY (AVIAIR)

File Number: 9020

#### **SUMMARY**

The Shire operates the Derby Airport and Aviair currently provides a regular passenger transport service (Derby/Broome) through our airport. A summary of the service is attached.

The State Government provides a subsidy to Aviair to enable this service to operate, and as part of the discussion around securing the original State Government funding for the service's trial, the Shire agreed to provide its Derby Airport facilities for zero cost (including providing the staff to undertake the airline's passenger ticketing and baggage handling obligations).

The trial concluded and the service was continued, with state government subsidies, but the Council has not formalised its position on its subsidy level since the service first commenced several years ago. The next state government budget (2025/26) will again consider its support for the subsidy, and it is appropriate that Council again formally consider its contribution towards that service.

This report recommends that the Shire subsidy continue (conditionally) in its current form.

#### **DISCLOSURE OF ANY INTEREST**

Nil applicable by Author.

#### **BACKGROUND**

The State Government provides a subsidy to enable this Derby/Broome service to operate and as part of the discussion around securing the original State Government funding for the service trial, the Shire agreed to provide its Derby Airport for zero cost (including providing the staff to undertake the airline's ticketing and baggage handling).

The trial concluded and the service was continued, with the WA State Government continuing to offer a subsidy. A new tender for the service was recently let (July) and the next state government budget (2025/26) will again consider its support for continuing with subsidy.

The Minister for Transport's Media Release of 10 July 2024 stated (amongst other things) that:

"Air services connecting Kimberley communities have been secured for a further two years, with the appointment of Aviair to operate regular public transport (RPT) air services between Derby and Broome until June 2026.

The appointment is the result of a competitive tender process and will allow Aviair to maintain four weekly return services on the route, subsidised by State Government funding of \$1.5 million over two-years, with airfares set at \$139 one-way.

Aviair has serviced the route with financial support from the State Government since August 2021, and also links Derby travellers to Perth via connecting flights from Broome."

Officers continue to work with the Department of Transport and Aviair on promoting the service but Council has not reviewed its position on the subsidy since the commencement of the original trial, several years ago.

Attached is a summary of the service, which operates between Derby and Broome several days per week and has a ticket price of \$139 (one way). There are numerous competing complexities, conflicts, traveller preferences, and commercial reality challenges that combine when considering the question of a subsidy for this service.

The Department of Transport is keen for the Shire to remain committed to making whatever contribution it can reasonably make towards the subsidy, and has shared the attached (confidential) financial information which highlights the high cost of the service subsidy required in order to enable a relatively low ticket price to prevail.

#### STATUTORY ENVIRONMENT

**Local Government Act S2.7 (Role of Council)** outlines that Council is responsible to govern the local government's affairs; oversee the allocation of the local government's finances and resources; and determine the local government's policies.

#### **POLICY IMPLICATIONS**

**Policy AF3 (Asset Management)** was adopted to ensure adequate provision is made for the long-term replacement of major assets by amongst other things, ensuring that the Shire's infrastructure is provided in a sustainable manner.

The provision of un-charged access to Shire assets diminishes the opportunity to fund asset maintenance and renewal. This is particularly the case for the Derby Airport, which has extensive assets and a relatively low revenue base when compared to the asset value of the airport.

#### FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

The Shire operates two airports (Derby, and Fitzroy Crossing). The combined net cost of these airports varies from year to year, but it is in the order of \$2m (approximately \$0.5m as a cash loss and \$1.5 in asset depreciation) per annum. RADS/RAUP grants assist greatly with capital refurbishments but without those, the total cost of the airports would reflect the equivalent of about 20% of the Shire's rates revenue when considered over the long term.

The Derby airport consumes most of the costs of the Shire's two Airports. If the Derby Airport could secure revenue streams from a regular passenger transport (RPT) service, or from a combination charter/RPT that might result from a mining operation like the Kimberley Mineral Sands project or the reopening of a diamond mine, a break-even financial result could be achievable. Presently however, there are no indications of a Perth/Derby RPT service recommencing at Derby, and there are no proposals from mining companies wishing to use Derby

Airport on a combination charter/RPT basis. Securing grants for airstrip refurbishments as and when required will as outlined earlier, considerably alleviate the Shire's asset management costs.

#### **CONSULTATION**

There is no requirement for community consultation, but Council might choose to engage with the community if it considers that is warranted prior to a final decision being made.

Consultation has occurred with Department of Transport and Aviair representatives.

#### COMMENT

The preference would be to have a direct Derby/Perth flight, but thus far no service provider has been able to formulate a commercially viable product, and no state government subsidy is on offer to enable such a service to commence in a subsidised form.

The "second-best" option is to retain the subsidy for the Derby/Broome route, but it has many competing considerations, like:

- Business Viability vs Shire Cost Recovery: It is not known what profit margin Aviair operates
  to, but for the Derby/Broome service it operates as a commercial for profit business (with a
  state government subsidy to ensure its commercial viability) so there may be existing
  capacity to charge normal airport charges; or it might be the added cost that causes the
  ticket price to rise or perhaps even the service to fail;
- Relative Contribution: The State Government subsidy is considerable when compared to the Shire's relatively small "free airport use" contribution – which means any withdrawal of that Shire subsidy might be seen by the State as the Shire not being sufficiently committed to the service or the funding partnership;

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- Accountable Process: The Aviair tender bid (which was successful) for the state government subsidy was an open and accountable process, but it did not incorporate a contribution to the Shire for use of the airport – which now makes it more difficult for the Shire to negotiate a change to its historic subsidy position;
- Passenger Support: The passenger numbers are relatively low which means travellers for some reason, do not see value/convenience in the offering. For example, the option of driving to Broome is often preferred by potential passengers, due to (for example) nett cost savings, vehicle parking security, flight link preferences, or travel flexibility – so the availability of the service is not critical to a wide number of the shire's residents or businesses. Lower passenger numbers also make it somewhat easier for the state government to justify withdrawing its subsidy;
- Flight Numbers: The relatively limited number of airplane arrival/departures is not convenient for a wide cross-section of the community but the service level cannot be increased without more customer, more subsidies, or higher ticket prices;
- Government Policy: Government staff use of the service is difficult to encourage as existing government travel policies and budget provisions for fuel/vehicles do not make changing to the Aviair flight service easy or attractive for them this substantially reduces the potential of achieving higher average passenger numbers;
- Ticket Pricing: The high cost of the service as it is now structured means that without
  ongoing subsidies, ticket pricing would reach unsustainable levels. It is not possible
  without more financial information from both the state government and Aviair to
  understand at what point the service might be self-sustaining in the market place, but
  based on an average customer base of approximately four for the current schedule,
  sustainability is unlikely without the subsidy, or without lower service levels applying.

Notwithstanding the many challenges, a periodic review of the Shire's subsidy is warranted. The current average passenger number is 4+, so a review if that number reaches 6+ (approximately 50% of plane seating capacity) would be justified. This higher level of ticketing sales might suggest a reasonable opportunity for the Shire to justify that a proportionate contribution towards Shire costs should commence. At the very least, Aviair should share its financial information with the Shire at some point to ensure that all parties are fairly contributing towards the continuation of the Derby/Broome service.

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#### **Passenger Demand**

- Current passenger demand on the Derby-Broome route is marginal.
- From the commencement of the RPT air service in August 2021 to June 2024 over 7,000 passengers used the RPT air service.

#### **Air Service Performance**

#### On Time Performance (OTP)

When a flight departs/arrives within 15 minutes of the scheduled time, it is considered to be on time. This is an airline industry benchmark. The OTP of flights can be affected by controllable or uncontrollable circumstances causing flight delays.

Controllable delays are those circumstances that cause flight delays within the airline's control and the airline has the capacity to rectify potential delays.

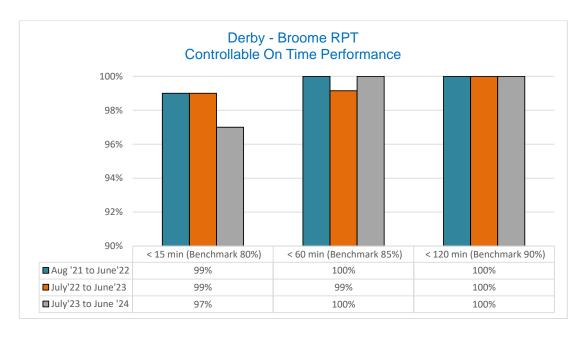
Uncontrollable delays are those circumstances that cause flight delays that are beyond the airline's control and capacity to rectify, such as bad weather conditions, airport congestion and air traffic control delays by third parties at airports.

#### **OTP Benchmarks**

Under the Deed of Agreement with the State, Aviair is required to meet or exceed the following:

- 80% controllable OTP for aircraft departures and arrivals within 15 minutes of scheduled departure and arrival times;
- 85% controllable OTP for aircraft departures and arrivals within 60 minutes of scheduled departure and arrival times; and
- 90% controllable OTP for aircraft departures and arrivals within 120 minutes of scheduled departure and arrival times.

The Controllable OTP has met or exceed the relevant benchmark for each of the three categories as demonstrated in the graph below.

#### **Baggage Allowance**

Checked and carry-on baggage allowance on Aviair's flights on the Derby-Broome route is:

- Each passenger occupying a paid seat is entitled to carry on cabin baggage of 5 kg.
- Passengers are permitted a 23 kg free checked-in baggage allowance.

Excess baggage may be carried subject to:

- the aircraft not exceeding the regulatory maximum take-off weight; and
- payment of an excess baggage charge.

#### Air Freight

Aviair carries air freight on the RPT air service when capacity allows. The Derby-Broome air service is a passenger transport air service, and priority is given to passengers and passenger baggage.

Aviair prioritises checked baggage and freight as follows:

- checked baggage within the 23 kg checked baggage allowance;
- urgent medical freight;
- excess checked baggage above the allowances listed above; and
- non-urgent freight.

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#### Aviair Cancelled/Delayed Flight Notification

In the event of an operational delay or cancellation, Aviair will send advice via suitable media to customers where check-in for the flight has not yet opened. For operational delays or cancellations that occur closer to the time of departure, customers will be advised at the time of check-in and kept updated via announcements within the airport terminal.

In addition, Aviair provides a flight disruption forecast by an enquiry phone number (1800 095 500) and up-to-date flight information on their website.

## 14.1 SALE OF REMAINING CURTIN AIRPORT TRANSPORTABLE ACCOMMODATION UNITS - DERBY AIRPORT

#### **SUMMARY**

This item is for Council to approve the proposal to advertise and dispose of the remaining two Curtin transportable accommodation units currently located at Derby Airport.

#### **DISCLOSURE OF ANY INTEREST**

Nil by Author and Responsible Officer.

#### **BACKGROUND**

There have been several previous attempts made to dispose of the surplus transportable accommodation units from Derby Airport. A number of the units have been allocated to local groups and other agencies or entities within the Shire, but two currently remain on site and both are beginning to show signs of age and deterioration.

The Shire initially received the transportable buildings from the Federal Government following the closure of the Curtin Detention Centre. Many of these transportable units were used to construct the new Derby Airport terminal and in recent times the Short Stay staff accommodation based at the Derby Depot and the Fitzroy Crossing Depot. Several were also sold to private individuals for use elsewhere. The Shire currently has no operational use for them.

Several previous attempts to dispose of the excess dongas resulted in Council donating a number of the units to local community groups (e.g. 13/2018 (22/2/2018) Derby Rodeo Association; 122/2018 (10/12/2018) Derby Speedway; and 015/2019 (28/2/2019) Derby Turf Club) noting the Turf club did not undertake the works and authorised the shire to use the unit in its accommodation upgrades.

#### STATUTORY ENVIRONMENT

#### Local Government Act 1995

#### 1.7. Local public notice

Where under this Act local public notice of a matter is required to be given, notice of the matter must be —

- (a) published on the official website of the local government concerned in accordance with the regulations; and
- (b) given in at least 3 of the ways prescribed for the purposes of this section.

[Section 1.7 inserted: No. 16 of 2019 s. 5.]

#### 3.58. Disposing of property

(1) In this section —

*dispose* includes to sell, lease, or otherwise dispose of, whether absolutely or not; *property* includes the whole or any part of the interest of a local government in property, but does not include money.

- (2) Except as stated in this section, a local government can only dispose of property to
  - (a) the highest bidder at public auction; or
  - (b) the person who at public tender called by the local government makes what is, in the opinion of the local government, the most acceptable tender, whether or not it is the highest tender.
- (3) A local government can dispose of property other than under subsection (2) if, before agreeing to dispose of the property
  - (a) it gives local public notice of the proposed disposition —

#### **SUMMARY**

This report seeks Council's approval for the awarding of tender - Establishment of a New Waste Facility: Derby. The approval will facilitate the commencement of tasks (Stage 1) associated with the establishment of a new site, including;

- conducting a multi-criteria analysis,
- land acquisition, and;
- preliminary concept design and budget estimate

Detailed design and operational costings will formulate stage 2 of the project.

Snowy Mountains Engineering Corporation (SMEC) is the recommended contractor to undertake these works.

#### **DISCLOSURE OF ANY INTEREST**

Nil by author. Nil by responsible officer.

#### **BACKGROUND**

The Shire of Derby West Kimberley produced a Landfill Closure Management Plan (LCMP) in 2014 for the Derby Waste Facility (DWF). It was noted within the LCMP 2014 that the DWF is fast approaching the end of its operational life, with a projected closure by 2030. However, the floods in January 2023 have significantly impacted the DWF expected operational life as a result of the household waste and demolition waste being transferred to the site from Fitzroy Crossing and Camballin. This incoming flood waste, received in 2023 and 2024 in the months of June and March respectively was equivalent to one year's typical waste intake for the facility, further reducing its operational lifespan.

As a result, there is an increased urgency to expedite the development of a new waste facility for Derby. This matter was previously addressed by the Council at its meeting on 28 March 2024, where the following resolutions were adopted:

#### 19.1 Waste Facility Site Identification Derby and Fitzroy Crossing 2024

This matter is considered to be confidential under Section 5.23(2) - c of the Local Government Act, and the Council is satisfied that discussion of this matter in an open meeting would, on balance, be contrary to the public interest as it deals with a contract entered into, or which may be entered into, by the local government and which relates to a matter to be discussed at the meeting.

#### That Council:

- Receives the report Waste Facility Site Identification Derby and Fitzroy Crossing prepared by ASK Waste Management Consulting;

Within AGRN1044 an allocation for waste management has been set up under account number 121407180. At present, an amount of \$250,000 of the total \$338,463 in the account has been allocated to service contracts. It will be recommended to increase the value of contractors in the account by \$500,000 to cover additional costs associated with this project.

The works associated with this project have been deemed eligible under the Disaster Recovery Funding Arrangements (DRFA) for Western Australia, specifically under the Category D Clean-Up Program. The requirement to increase and/or establish new additional landfill capacity is documented and approved in the State Governments Kimberley Floods State Recovery and Resilience Plan 2023 – 2024 (referenced under Environmental and Heritage, recovery and resilience priorities— approved initiative's and activities) Upon finalisation of the tender process discussions will occur with DFES around the award and projected timelines for the project.

#### **CONSULTATION**

Officers have engaged in consultations with the Department of Planning, Lands, and Heritage to secure the necessary licence for conducting onsite investigations at the proposed sites. A key component of this process will involve obtaining formal consent from the relevant traditional landowners and lessees, which is a prerequisite for the issuance of the licence.

Should the project be awarded, an extensive consultation process will be undertaken, involving a broad range of community members and stakeholders. This will include formal engagement with the Department of Water and Environmental Regulation, as well as other relevant government agencies, industry stakeholders, and local interest groups. This consultation will ensure that all environmental, social, and cultural considerations are comprehensively addressed.

Preliminary discussions will be held with the Registered Native Title Bodies Corporate (RNTBCs), and these meetings will remain ongoing. The Shire is committed to continuing this collaborative approach with traditional landowners and other stakeholders throughout the project's lifecycle, ensuring that all perspectives are considered and that the project complies with statutory and cultural obligations.

The Department of Water Environmental Regulation will also be consulted as they will also issue a licence and works approval for the operations of a waste facility.

It must be noted that a best value for money approach is applied to the decision of a suitable contractor.

A notable disparity exists between the information provided by SMEC and Talis consultants (Talis). SMEC's submission includes a well as integrated project management framework and the costs associated with undertaking that work. In contrast, Talis provided a lump sum, which encompasses professional and service fee costs; however, Talis did not account for any investigative works required for the project.

The submission by SMEC is far more comprehensive and displays a thought-out process to the timeline and work required to decide on a potential new landfill site. Talis however do not provide a great level of detail compared to SMEC and therefore to not give adequate confidence in regards to the suitability of them as a contractor.

SMEC's proposal yielded a higher score due to its more comprehensive approach, particularly in covering both provisional and project management components, as well as the clarity and detail of their deliverables, as outlined in **Attachment 1**.

It is therefore recommended that SMEC be awarded the tender for the Establishment of a New Waste Facility in Derby due to their comprehensive submission, confidence in costs and providing the best value for money.

#### **DISCLOSURE OF ANY INTEREST**

#### **BACKGROUND**

The Club has been operating at the Derby Memorial Swimming Pool (DMSP) for over 30 years, and is recognised as one of the five longest-standing clubs within the Shire.

It is a not-for-profit, family-oriented community swimming club. Its ongoing strength and success as a leading sporting organisation, and ongoing viability and sustainability as an operational entity, can be attributed to the dedicated support of a committed group of parents, volunteers, coaches and participants. The training provided by The club provides valuable opportunities for another stream of physical activity for young people and their families in Derby, and attracts a different target market from other after-school programs. It is therefore, an important community asset.

Prior to 2021, The Club utilised the DMSP on an ad-hoc basis without lane hire charges. It was identified that there were certain conflicts of interest and a need for structure and clarity. Throughout this process, it became clear that a formal user agreement was required to specify usage days, times, and space allocations. Council waived facility hire fees in 2021 to support The Club's development. This support allowed The Club's committee, time to complete the necessary tasks to bring The Club to operational capacity. To achieve this, several governance tasks needed to be completed, including:

- Reforming a committee;
- Establishing a membership system;
- Updating and adopting a new constitution to comply with the Associations Incorporation Act 2015;
- Affiliation with the Western Australian Swimming Association; and
- Have suitably qualified training coaches to provide coaching support for club activities

At the start of the 2021/22 season, The Club initially requested access to three lanes of the Derby Memorial Swimming Pool, which the Shire accommodated. As the Club's membership grew, they sought an increase to four lanes. To address this request, the Shire approved a six-week trial allowing The Club to use four lanes for training purposes. Throughout the trial, the Shire monitored the usage and implications of this lane allocation, noting any significant impact on public access and community satisfaction.

Due to the number and types of concerns that presented during the six-week trial, Council reviewed the documentation and declined the request from The Club for the allocation of four lanes in the 2022/2023 and 2023/2024 user agreements.

#### STATUTORY ENVIRONMENT

The Associations Incorporation Act (WA) 2015 applies to the operation of Derby Amateur Swimming Club Inc.

Part 6, division 5 of the *Local Government Act 1995* deals with financing local government activities. Subdivision 2 deals specifically with setting fees and charges.

#### POLICY IMPLICATIONS

#### FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

User agreements offer community-based sporting groups the opportunity to secure regular facility bookings at a discounted rate. This arrangement benefits the community by supporting important and engaging activities, whilst also helping the Shire to recover some costs associated with the facility, in an effort to maintain adequate asset management and ongoing operations. These costs include:

- Resources: Materials, staffing and equipment used for operating the facility
- Utilities: Expenses related to electricity, water and insurance
- Facility Wear and Tear: Costs for general maintenance and repairs due to regular use

#### The Club's Request:

The below highlights the clubs requested usage together with the costs that would be incurred, If Council's authorised fees and charges were to be applied:

#### 1. Four lanes on Tuesday and Thursday afternoons during opening hours:

- 4 Lanes for (2 hours) (\$136.00 per day)
- Annual Cost: \$11,611.00

#### 2. Wednesday Mornings:

- 3 Lanes for 1 hour (\$34.00 per day)
- Annual Cost: \$1,683.00

#### 3. Additional slots outside regular pool operational hours:

Max Duration: 3 Hours

Annual Cost: \$2,700.00

#### Total Calculated Cost: \$14,446.00

In an effort to support The Club in its request and to meet the needs of the community, the Shire is proposing a revised time allocation from 4.00pm to 6:30pm. The Club will also be offered private use of the facility after-hours on Tuesdays and Thursdays to offer greater flexibility, and to reduce the impact on operations and the community.

Whilst the Shire understands that in seeking this compromise between the Shire and the Club, the proposed arrangement increases the total by \$3,609.00. The shire recognises that The Club is vital to the liveability of the community, sport and recreational actives and our young people.

This report proposes the allocation of the following facility usage over a period of twelve months to The Club under the new user agreement:

#### The Shire Proposal:

#### 1. Four lanes on Tuesday and Thursday afternoons with public and private use:

- Four lanes for (2 hours) (\$136.00 per day)
- Cost: \$14,233.00

#### 1. Wednesday Mornings:

- Two Lanes for 1 hour (\$34.00 per day)
- Cost: \$1,224.00

#### 2. Additional slots outside regular pool operational hours:

Max Duration: 3 Hours

• Cost: \$2,700.00

#### Total Proposed Cost: \$18,055.00

The Derby Memorial Swimming Pool has the lowest admission fees in the Kimberley, to ensure equitable and fair access to community, surrounding areas and visitors. The admission fee supports the ongoing operations of the pool. The Shire considers that the payment of an admission fee by all users is appropriate given the considerable discount and access afforded to The Club at this time.

The 2022/23 user agreement totalled \$9,645.00. The increase in the total value for lane and private hire usage compared to the previous agreement, is due to the Club's request for extensions on their existing facility hire. If the Council approves this proposal, the total hire costs for the 2024/25 user agreement will increase by \$4,801.00. However, to support The Club and ensure its accessibility, The Shire is proposing that the agreement is heavily subsidised.

The proposed user agreement fee pending Council approval is \$1,200.00. This fee aligns other sporting user agreements.

\*It should be noted that should The Club need to seek further financial assistance from the Shire, they are encouraged to seek support through the CSDWK Community Grants Program.

NB: Additional usage beyond the stipulated times will be charged according to the hourly or daily rates outlined in the adopted Schedule of Fees and Charges.

- Two lanes on Wednesday mornings; and
- Friday race nights bookings (up to 3 hours) totalling nine bookings over the course of their agreement.

#### **Derby Pool usage information:**

- The pool is over seventy years old, and whilst it is continuing to service the Derby and surrounding communities, it has many limitations. The Shire has a strategic intent to seek to redevelop the pool within five years.
- It is a six-lane pool however, the lanes are not the standard width of competition pools (2.5m 3.5m wide). It is difficult for adults and larger children to swim two abreast or in opposite directions. It is not uncommon for patrons to accidentally clash body parts with each other which can result in minor injury.
- The pool includes steps in lane one, which span the entire width of the lane. This design restricts lane one to walkers or leisure activities such as young children playing, due to the space needed for safe egress and exit.
- The pool features a steep drop-off with the depth reaching 1.5 meters at the 12.5-meter mark. Consequently, only about one-third of the pool is suitable for walking or exercise without a flotation device.
- Access to the pools hoist requires lanes 2 & 3 to operate, and The Club requires these lanes. This therefore limits access during their proposed times for limited mobility patrons.

During the four-lane trial in 2021 and a smaller trial over August and September 2024 certain observations were noted during both trials.

#### 1. Feedback and Impact:

- There were verbal and written complaints received about the lack of available lanes for general use and lap swimming from paid members.
  - O During the 2021 four lane trial, four written letters of complaint were received detailing the lack of space, and how The Club took too much space with small numbers.

- Verbal comments and complaints were made at least weekly to front of house staff about the value of their membership if they can't access the pool or lap lanes during squad times.
   Multiple other negative comments from other patrons towards the club were received.
- Four members gave the reason for cancelling their memberships and passes in 2021/22, as being
  mostly due to lack of lap space available during the afternoon. This was before they started their
  work shifts, and they felt unsafe with the number of general patrons in the pool during squad
  sessions.
- It has been observed during the 2024 four-week trial for four lane usage, approximately eight
  members and general patrons left shortly after the commencement of The Club's training
  sessions. Six members and patrons choose not to enter the facility. Common general feedback
  received was regarding the reduced availability of swimming lap lanes and overcrowding in the
  public access lanes.

#### 2. Lane availability and operational challenges:

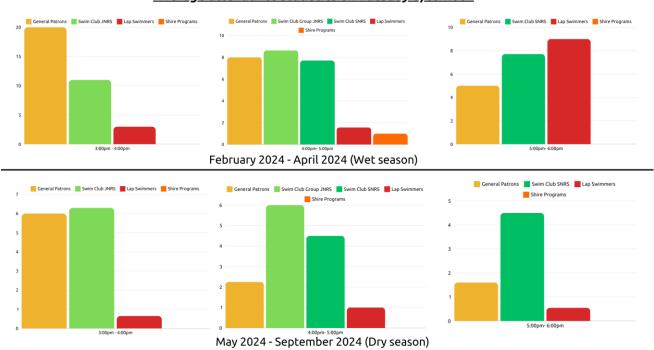
- The highest usage by the general public during the wet season and the towns hotter months is straight after school, generally between 2.15pm 4:00pm.
- The pools design resulted in only two lanes remaining available for public use: one for walking/leisure and one for general lap swimming.
- It was noted by staff during the four-lane trail in 2021 that overcrowding amongst the general public and lap swimmers. This became an issue with the increase in the number of patrons attending the facility. With the increase in patrons there was also increase in minor incidents including:
  - Weak swimmers slipping off the safety ledge needing assistance and direction;
  - Patrons jumping on other patrons; and
  - Collisions between lap swimmers and the general public.
- It was also noted during the trial that there was an increase in afterschool bookings and lap swimmers attending the facility. This was managed effectively by increasing the number of staff on shift, and lower general patron loads after The Club commenced their sessions.

#### **Shire Programming Challenges**

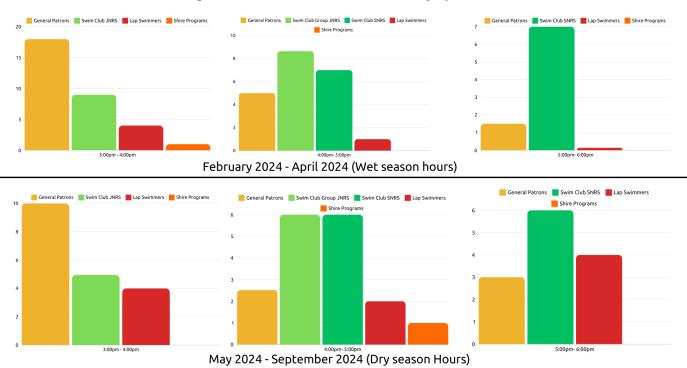
- The Shire operates a 'Learn to Swim' Program during after school hours for school aged children during the week. This includes Tuesday and Thursday afternoons, which are the more popular days for attendance.
- Due to the timing and the Club utilising three lanes which is half of the main pool space occupied, together with the need to leave sufficient space for lap swimming and public access, the Shire has struggled to accommodate and effectively run the 'Learn to Swim' Program.
- As a result, there has been a noticeable decline in participation from 2022 to 2024 in the 'Learn to Swim' program. Approximately 40 children enrolled in the program, and staff noted fewer participants progressing to a level of competence required to join the Club.
- The Shire recognises that it is a delicate balancing act to accommodate both The Club and the community. Staff have come to the following conclusions:
  - The reduction in lane availability for general community members who wish to access the pool for lap swimming or leisure, potentially leads to difficulties accessing the pool during peak times. There is a greater impact on patrons utilising the pool during wet season hours (October – April).
  - The remaining public access lane does become overcrowded, affecting the experience for general patrons. It is noted that the impacts are not as significant during the pools dry season hours (April – September).

It is intended that the agreement strikes a balance between lane usage, access and availability for the club and the general public usage.

It is considered reasonable to endorse the use of four lanes from 4:00pm to 6:30pm, provided there is effective management and clear communication with the public. This timing adjustment aims to minimise disruption for public swimmers and ensure a more balanced use of the pool.

The Club has requested three lanes on a Wednesday morning. Due to ongoing public usage and numbers, this isn't considered possible at this time due.

It is further proposed that the \$1,200.00 is considered a fair and equitable user agreement fee. Admission fees are also considered to be reasonable and applicable to all users of the pool.

## Licence Agreement to use Community Facility

Between Shire of Derby/West Kimberley, and Derby Armature Swimming Club Inc.

**Derby Memorial Swimming Pool** 

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#### **Parties**

**Shire of Derby/West Kimberley**, a body corporate pursuant to the Local Government Act 1995 of PO Box 94, Derby, Western Australia (**Shire**)

**Derby Armature Swimming Club Inc.,** a community-based sporting organisation pursuant to the Associations Incorporation Act 2015 of PO Box 1219, Derby, Western Australia, 6728. **(Licensee)** 

#### **Background**

- A The Shire owns or manages the Land which includes the Community Facility.
- B The Shire has agreed to grant to the Licensee the right to use and occupy the Licensed Area subject to the terms and conditions contained in this Licence.

#### Operative provisions

#### 1 Definitions and interpretation

#### **Definitions**

1.1 In this Licence the following definitions apply:

#### **Authorised Persons** means:

- (a) an agent, employee, licensee, contractor or invitee of the Licensee;
- (b) any person visiting the Licensed Area with the express or implied consent of any person referred to in paragraph (a) of this definition;
- (c) any person claiming under or through the Licensee.

Authorised Use is defined in Item 9 of Schedule 1.

Commencement Date is defined in Item 6 of Schedule 1.

Community Facility is defined in Item 1 of Schedule 1.

Council means the council of the Shire.

**Default Interest Rate** means 10% per annum above the Reserve Bank of Australia target cash rate from time to time.

End Date is defined in Item 8 of Schedule 1.

**Event of Default** means any of the events or occurrences set out in clause 18.1 of this Licence.

**GST means** goods and services tax or similar value added tax levied or imposed in Australia pursuant to the GST Law or otherwise on a supply.

GST Act means A New Tax System (Goods and Services Tax) Act 1999 (Cth).

GST Law has the same meanings as in the GST Act.

**Land** is defined in Item 2 of Schedule 1 and where the context so requires includes the Community Facility.

**Laws** mean all statutes, rules, regulations, proclamations, ordinances, local laws, or by-laws present or future and includes applicable Australian Standards and Codes of Practice as varied from time to time.

**Licence** means this agreement and the Schedules and, where applicable, any appendices, plans or other attachments to this agreement as amended from time to time.

Licensed Area is defined in Item 3 of Schedule 1.

Licence Fee is defined in Item 4 of Schedule 1.

Minister means Minister for Lands.

**Occupiers** mean any person (other than the Licensee) with a right to use any part of the Land from time to time.

Party or Parties means respectively a party or parties to this Licence.

**Plant and Equipment** means the plant and equipment used in connection with the provision of any utilities or services or the heating, cooling, lighting, power or plumbing for the Licensed Area.

**Relevant Authority** means any government, statutory, public or other authority or body having jurisdiction over the Land or any matter or thing relating to the Land on the Land.

**Requirements** mean any requirements, notices, orders or directions of any Relevant Authority.

Review Dates is defined in Item 5 of Schedule 1.

Special Conditions means the special conditions set out in Schedule 2.

Term is defined in Item 7 of Schedule 1.

**Written Law** has the same meaning given to that term in the *Interpretation Act 1984* (WA) as varied from time to time

#### Interpretation

- 1.2 In the interpretation of this Licence, the following provisions apply unless the context otherwise requires:
  - 1.2.1 Headings are inserted for convenience only and do not affect the interpretation of this Licence.
  - 1.2.2 A reference in this Licence to a business day means a day other than a Saturday, Sunday or public holiday in Perth, Western Australia.

- 1.2.3 If the day on which any act, matter or thing is to be done under this Licence is not a business day, the act, matter or thing must be done on the next business day.
- 1.2.4 A reference in this Licence to dollars or \$ means Australian dollars and all amounts payable under this Licence are payable in Australian dollars.
- 1.2.5 A reference in this Licence to any law, legislation or legislative provision includes any statutory modification, amendment or re-enactment, and any subordinate legislation or regulations issued under that legislation or legislative provision.
- 1.2.6 A reference in this Licence to any agreement or document is to that agreement or document as amended, novated, supplemented or replaced.
- 1.2.7 A reference to a clause, part, schedule or attachment is a reference to a clause, part, schedule or attachment of or to this Licence.
- 1.2.8 An expression importing a natural person includes any company, trust, partnership, joint venture, association, body corporate or governmental agency.
- 1.2.9 Where a word or phrase is given a defined meaning, another part of speech or other grammatical form in respect of that word or phrase has a corresponding meaning.
- 1.2.10 A word which denotes the singular also denotes the plural, a word which denotes the plural also denotes the singular, and a reference to any gender also denotes the other genders.
- 1.2.11 A reference to the word 'include' or 'including' is to be construed without limitation.
- 1.2.12 Any schedules and attachments form part of this Licence.

#### 2 Grant of Licence

- 2.1 The Shire grants to the Licensee, subject to the consent of the Minister (where relevant) and the Licensee accepts, a licence to use the Licensed Area for the Term from the Commencement Date to the End Date solely for the Authorised Use on the terms and conditions of this Licence.
- 2.2 The rights under this Licence are in contract only and no estate or interest in the Licensed Area is conferred on the Licensee by this Licence.
- 2.3 This Licence shall relate only to the Licensed Area and the Shire shall at all times be entitled to use, occupy and deal with the remainder of the Land and the Community Facility without reference to the Licensee.

#### 3 Conditions Precedent

#### **Local Government Condition**

3.1 This Licence is subject to and expressly conditional on the Shire complying with the procedures set out in section 3.58 of the *Local Government Act 1995* (WA) relating to disposal of property.

#### **Land Administration Act**

3.2 If the Land is subject to the provisions of the Land Administration Act 1997 (WA) then this Licence is subject to and expressly conditional on the Minister granting his or her consent to this Licence.

#### **Best Endeavours**

3.3 The Parties covenant and agree that where relevant, the Parties will each use their best endeavours to satisfy the conditions precedent in clauses 3.1 and 3.2.

#### Costs

3.4 The Shire will bear all costs associated with satisfying the conditions precedent in clauses 3.1 and 3.2.

#### Refusal or granted subject to conditions

- 3.5 If any approval:
  - 3.5.1 is refused; or
  - 3.5.2 granted subject to a condition that the Licensee in its reasonable opinion is unable to comply with, and the Licensee within 10 business days after being notified of the condition elects, by notice in writing to the Shire, to withdraw from this Licence;
- 3.6 then, this Licence, except this clause, ceases to have effect and no party has any claim against the other party.

#### 4 Licence Fee

- 4.1 The Licensee must pay the annual Licence Fee to the Shire on the Commencement Date and on each first day of July following the Commencement Date without any deduction or set-off by way or direct payment to the Shire or as the Shire may direct.
- 4.2 The first payment of the Licence Fee must be paid to the Shire on the Commencement Date and will be calculated on a pro-rata basis so that the Licensee pays the Licence Fee for the period from the Commencement Date to the first 30 June during the Term of this Licence.

#### 5 Licence Fee Review

5.1 On a Review Date the Licence Fee shall be reviewed in accordance with the provisions of clauses 5.2 to 5.5 (inclusive).

#### Licence Fee Review

- 5.2 With effect from each Review Date, the Shire shall review the Licence Fee so that it is an amount determined or calculated in accordance with the then current Shire of Derby/West Kimberley adopted annual fees for licensing of Shire assets (facilities, buildings and land) and in line with Policy ES5 and any other relevant Policies, which have been passed by resolution of Council.
- 5.3 The Shire shall give the Licensee a notice setting the Licence Fee, however the failure of the Shire to give such a notice before the Review Date does not preclude the Shire from giving such a notice in respect of that Review Date at any later time.

#### **Payment of Reviewed Licence Fee**

- 5.4 The Licensee will be liable to pay the reviewed annual Licence Fee from the relevant Review Date whether or not the Shire has notified the Licensee of the amount to which the annual Licence Fee has been varied.
- 5.5 If the Shire has not given notice of the reviewed annual Licence Fee to the Licensee and the Licensee continues to pay Licence Fee at the rate of the current annual Licence Fee until the Shire notifies the Licensee of the reviewed annual Licence Fee, the Licensee will not be in default for non-payment of Licence Fee provided that when the Shire notifies the Licensee of the amount of the reviewed annual Licence Fee, any necessary adjustment is made within 10 business days of service of the Licence Fee review notice.

#### 6 Licensee Covenants

#### Use

6.1 The Licensee must not use or permit the Licensed Area to be used for any purpose other than the Authorised Use.

#### Improvements and Additions

- 6.2 The Licensee must not erect, construct, build, install or bring any buildings or structures of a permanent nature on the Licensed Area or make any other alterations, additions or improvements on the Licensed Area except in accordance with clause 13 of this Licence.
- 6.3 Unless otherwise agreed in writing, every building and fitting, fixture or structure erected, fixed or placed upon the Licensed Area shall become the absolute property of the Shire and shall not be removed from the Licensed Area or moved to any other part of the Land except with the prior written consent of the Shire.

#### Maintenance

- 6.4 The Licensee must:
  - 6.4.1 maintain the Licensed Area in a good condition and state of repair, except in respect of:
    - (i) fair wear and tear; and

- (ii) damage which is or will be reinstated from the proceeds of insurance;
- 6.4.2 promptly repair any damage to the Licensed Area for which the Licensee is responsible to the satisfaction of the Shire;
- 6.4.3 keep the Licensed Area clean and free from rubbish;
- 6.4.4 not do or omit to do anything which might cause the Licensed Area to deteriorate or become impaired except for fair wear and tear, to be obstructed, or to be in a condition other than a good and sanitary condition;
- 6.4.5 not without the Shire's prior consent, interfere with or modify the electricity supply or its reticulation, or install any electrical equipment on the Licensed Area which might overload the cables, switchboards or sub-boards through which electricity is connected to the Licensed Area;
- 6.4.6 not without the Shire's prior written consent interfere with or modify the drainage or water supply facilities (if any) serving the Licensed Area or any equipment connected to such facility;
- 6.4.7 not without the Shire's prior consent, erect or place on or in the Licensed Area any radio or television aerial or antenna;
- 6.4.8 keep all roads, driveways and access ways (if any) on the Land free of rubbish and debris and ensure that they are not obstructed; and
- 6.4.9 if this Licence is in respect of the whole of the Land, maintain all roads, driveways and access ways (if any) on the Licensed Area.

# Report to the Shire

- 6.5 The Licensee shall report promptly to the Shire in writing:
  - 6.5.1 all damage or defects in the Licensed Area of which the Licensee is or ought to be aware; and
  - 6.5.2 any circumstances likely to be a danger or cause any damage or danger to the Licensed Area and the Licensee's fixtures or any person in or on the Licensee Area and the Licensee's fixtures of which the Licensee is aware.
- The Licensee must also report all damage, defects or maintenance requests or suggestions to the Shire by submitting an email with the relevant information to SDWK@SDWK.wa.gov.au.

### **Nuisance**

- 6.7 The Licensee must take all reasonable precautions against the outbreak of fire on the Licensed Area and to make firebreaks upon the Licensed Area and at the locations and to the specifications required by the Shire and to permit the entry of the Shire its officers and servants or agents on to the Licensed Area for the purpose of abating any fire on or in the vicinity of the Licensed Area.
- The Licensee shall not do or permit anything to be done on or in relation to the Land, which may be or may become a danger or a nuisance to the Shire or other persons

authorised by the Shire to enter or use the Land or to the owner or occupier of any adjoining or nearby land.

### **Unlawful Activities**

The Licensee must not do or carry on in the Licensed Area any activity which might be harmful, offensive or illegal, or cause a nuisance, damage or disturbance to the Shire or the Occupiers or the owners or occupiers of any nearby properties.

### Rubbish

- 6.10 The Licensee must not:
  - 6.10.1 place any rubbish on or in any part or the Licensed Area except in a suitable receptacle; or
  - 6.10.2 burn any rubbish in or on the Licensed Area.

### Floor Overloading

6.11 The Licensee must not do any act or thing which might result in overloading any part of the floor of the Licensed Area.

### **Goods and Chemicals**

- 6.12 The Licensee must not:
  - 6.12.1 except for reasonable quantities for normal applications in connection with the Authorised Use of the Licensed Area, bring onto, store or use any chemical or inflammable substance in or on the Licensed Area; and
  - 6.12.2 store goods on or in the Licensed Area other than those necessary for the Authorised Use.
- 6.13 On request, the Licensee must supply the Shire with material safety data sheets for any chemicals or inflammable substance which the Licensee is permitted to bring onto, store or use in or on the Licensed Area under clause 6.12.1 of this Licence.

# Signs, advertisements or notices

- 6.14 The Licensee must not display from or affix to the Licensed Area any signs, advertisements or notices visible from outside the Licensed Area without the prior consent of the Shire which the Shire may not unreasonably withhold in the case of a notice:
  - 6.14.1 stating the Licensee's name; and
  - 6.14.2 affixed in a place immediately adjacent to the Licensed Area.
- 6.15 If approved, the signage, advertisement or notice must be secured in a substantial and proper manner so as not to cause any damage to the Community Facility or any person and the Licensee must at the end or earlier termination of the Term remove the signage, advertisement or notice and make good any damage.

# Inspection by the Shire

6.16 The Licensee must permit the Shire to inspect the Licensed Area at all reasonable times.

### **Public Events**

The Licensee must not hold any public event at the Licensed Area except with the prior written consent of the Shire and the Minister (where relevant).

# **Annual General Meeting**

6.18 On the Commencement Date and on each 1 July during the Term of this Licence, if the Licensee is a community or sports organisation, the Licensee must provide the Shire with a copy of the minutes of each Annual General Meeting, an end of year financial statement report, and also provide updated contact details for each of the persons holding the positions of President, Vice President, Secretary and Treasurer in the community or sports organisation.

#### **Toilets**

- 6.19 The toilets, sinks and drains shall be used for their designed purposes only and the Licensee must keep them clear and unobstructed and ensure no substance is deposited into them which could damage or block them.
- 6.20 If toilets are comprised within the Licensed Area, the Licensee must ensure that the toilet facility is kept clean and appropriate toiletries and sanitary bins are provided and regularly emptied.

# 7 Licensee to pay for utilities and services

### Utilities and services separately assessed

7.1 In accordance with the proportions outlined in Schedule 2 (Special Conditions) the Licensee must pay to the Shire within 30 days of issue of a tax invoice or, if demand is made by a service provider, the service provider all charges for water, gas, electricity, telephones and other utilities or services, including line charges and the cost of installation of any meter, wiring or other device necessitated by the use of a utility and service or rubbish collection charges which are separately charged or assessed in respect of the Licensed Area or the Licensee.

# Utilities and services not separately assessed

7.2 In accordance with the proportions outlined in Schedule 2 (Special Conditions) where any charges for water, gas, electricity, telephones and other utilities or services, including line charges and the cost of installation of any meter, wiring or other device necessitated by the use of a utility and service or rubbish collection charges are not separately charged or assessed in respect of the Licensed Area or the Licensee then, the Licensee must pay to the Shire within 30 days of issue of a tax invoice such fair proportion of those utilities and services as determined by the Shire (acting reasonably).

# 8 Comply with Laws

8.1 The Licensee must promptly observe and comply in all respects with all Laws, Requirements and rules relating to the Land and the Community Facility and the Licensee's use of it.

### 9 Risk

9.1 The Licensee agrees to occupy and use the Licensed Area at the Licensee's sole risk.

### 10 Insurance

### **Public Risk insurance**

- 10.1 The Licensee must during the Term, effect and maintain adequate public risk insurance cover applicable to the Licensee's use of the Licensed Area for at least \$20,000,000 (being the amount which may be paid out arising from any single accident or event) or any increased amount that the Shire may from time to time require.
- The Licensee must supply the Shire with a certificate of currency from the insurer on request.

# Licensee's Obligation to effect other insurances

- 10.3 In addition to public risk insurance, the Shire may at any time require the Licensee by notice in writing to effect and maintain other policies of insurance relating to the Licensed Area and the Licensee's fixtures or contents or otherwise as reasonably required by the Shire from time to time, including policies of insurance for:
  - 10.3.1 employers' indemnity insurance including workers' compensation insurance in respect of all employees of the Licensee employed in or about the Licensed Area;
  - 10.3.2 any other matter or thing which the Shire reasonably requires by notice to the Licensee.
- 10.4 If the Shire has issued a written notice to the Licensee to effect other insurance under clause 10.3, the Licensee must:
  - 10.4.1 supply to the Shire the current details of all insurance effected in accordance with this clause, including copies of certificates of insurance or policy documents and receipts for premiums as updated, amended or varied from time to time;
  - 10.4.2 not without the Shire's prior consent, alter the terms or conditions of any policy; and
  - 10.4.3 ensure that each policy of insurance includes a provision for cross liability and waiver of subrogation rights in favour of the Shire.

### Licensee not to invalidate insurance

10.5 The Licensee must not by any act or omission cause or allow anything to be done which might result in any insurance policy effected under this Licence or in respect of the Licensed Area and the Licensee's fixtures becoming void or voidable or which might increase the premium on any policy.

# 11 Limit of Shire's liability

### No warranties or representations

- 11.1 The Licensee acknowledges and agrees that:
  - 11.1.1 all the Licensee's fixtures and other Licensee's property in or on the Licensed Area shall be at the sole risk of the Licensee during the Term and the Shire shall not be liable for any claim, loss or damage that the Licensee may suffer as a result of:
    - (i) any fault in the construction or state of repair of the Licensed Area, the Licensee's fixtures or the Shire's fixtures;
    - (ii) any defect in any of the Plant and Equipment;
    - (iii) any flow, overflow, leakage or breakdown of any water, airconditioning, gas, power or other source of energy whether from the Licensed Area or otherwise;
  - 11.1.2 the Licensee has not relied on any representation or warranty of the Shire in entering into this Licence and, for this purpose, the Licensee acknowledges that:
    - the Licensee has relied on the Licensee's own skill and judgment and has made the Licensee's own enquiries in determining the suitability of the Licensed Area for the Authorised Use; and
    - (ii) the Licensee's occupation of the Licensed Area is conclusive evidence of the Licensee's acceptance of the Licensed Area as being in good order, repair and condition at the Commencement Date.

### **Shire Not Liable**

The Shire is not liable to the Licensee and the Licensee will not make a claim against the Shire in respect of any liability resulting from any accident, death, injury, damage to any property (including water damage), equipment, or machinery malfunction, interruption of services, theft or other event of a similar nature in or affecting or the Licensed Area.

### Licensee acts at own risk

11.3 Unless this Licence provides otherwise, whenever the Licensee is obligated or required by this Licence to do or omit to do any act or thing, the doing or the omission of the act or thing will be at the sole risk and expense of the Licensee.

# 12 Indemnity and release

### **General indemnity**

- 12.1 The Licensee indemnifies, and shall keep indemnified the Shire and the Minister against all actions, losses, claims, damages, proceedings, suits, demands, costs and expenses for which the Shire or the Minister become liable in respect of loss or damage to property or death or injury of any nature and however or wherever sustained:
  - 12.1.1 which are caused or contributed to by the use or occupancy of the Licensed Area by the Licensee or any Authorised Persons;
  - 12.1.2 resulting from an act or omission of the Licensee; or
  - 12.1.3 resulting from a notice, claim or demand against the Licensee to do or refrain from doing anything except to the extent that the Shire is obliged by this License to pay for or contribute to the cost of compliance with the notice, claim or demand and fails to do so.

# Nature of indemnity

The obligation of the Licensee to indemnify the Shire and the Minister under this Licence or at law is not affected by the obligation of the Licensee to effect insurance and all indemnities shall survive the termination of this Licence.

# 13 Alterations by the Licensee

- 13.1 The Licensee must obtain the Shire's prior written approval (as distinct from any consent that the Licensee may require from the Shire as Relevant Authority) if the Licensee wishes to carry out any work not provided for in any plans previously approved by the Shire.
- The Shire may in its absolute discretion decline consent, or may require a variation of this licence or require a new licence be entered into at the cost of the Licensee to record any such alteration.
- 13.3 For the avoidance of any doubt, the Licensee must obtain and comply with all necessary consents and will be responsible for all costs in carrying out any approved alterations and must comply with the Shire's reasonable directions in carrying out any work.

# 14 Assignment

14.1 The Licensee shall not transfer or assign or sub-licence its rights under this Licence except with the prior written consent of the Shire and the Minister (where relevant), which may be withheld at the absolute discretion of the Shire or the Minister.

### 15 Costs

### Costs

- 15.1 The Licensee must pay or reimburse the Shire on demand for all the Shire's reasonable costs and expenses (including the Shire's legal and consultancy costs and expenses) in relation to:
  - 15.1.1 the preparation, execution, negotiation, and stamping of this Licence;
  - 15.1.2 the exercise or enforcement by the Shire of any right under this Licence;
  - 15.1.3 any act or omission by the Licensee causing cost or expense to the Shire; and
  - 15.1.4 obtaining or giving any consent or approval under this Licence, or a variation or surrender of this Licence.

### **Duty and other costs**

15.2 The Licensee must pay or reimburse the Shire on demand for all duty, taxes, levies, charges and fees, and fines and penalties in respect of any of them, which may be payable in connection with this Licence.

### Interest on other moneys

15.3 If any monies payable by the Licensee remain unpaid for 30 days after their due date then the Licensee shall pay to the Shire interest on those payments at the Default Interest Rate calculated from their due date to the date of payment and such interest shall be compounded monthly.

### 16 GST

- The Licence Fee and other moneys payable under this Licence have been calculated without regard to GST, and the Shire and the Licensee agree that the Shire shall be entitled to charge an additional amount if the Shire becomes subject to GST as a result of the grant of this Licence or any supply to the Licensee under or in connection with this Licence, and the following provisions shall apply.
- The Licensee must do everything reasonably requested by the Shire to ensure this Licence is treated as taxable for the purposes of the GST, the Licensee must pay the GST to the Shire at the same time as the payment to which the GST relates, and the Licence Fee and other amounts payable under this Licence are exclusive of GST.
- 16.3 The Licensee must pay to the Shire on demand any GST charged on goods and services acquired or payable or paid by the Shire in connection with this Licence or the Licensed Area, including but not limited to any GST payable in connection with or in respect of the provision of any utilities and services and the Licence Fee;
- Words used in this clause which have a defined meaning in the GST Law have the same meanings as in the GST Law unless the context indicates otherwise.

### 17 Shire's covenants

Shire's responsibility for repairs and maintenance

- 17.1 The Shire must keep and maintain the building, all building services and the Shire's improvements on the Land in good order and condition but the Shire shall not be liable or responsible for any:
  - 17.1.1 repair or maintenance of any alterations carried out by the Licensee in accordance with clause 13;
  - 17.1.2 repair or maintenance which the Licensee is responsible for under the terms of this Licence; or
  - 17.1.3 repair or maintenance that is not reasonably necessary for the Licensee's use of the Licensed Area as determined by the Shire (acting reasonably).
- 17.2 Unless otherwise provided in this Licence, the Shire is responsible for organising and paying for annual pest control inspections, servicing of fire extinguishers, exit lights, security lights, fire hydrants, air conditioners (not owned by the Licensee) and recertification of any fall arrest systems located in the Community Facility.

### Shire's Right of Access

- 17.3 The Shire and the Shire's employees and contractors may at all reasonable times (and at any time in the case of an emergency) enter the Licensed Area with all necessary equipment to carry out repairs, maintenance or improvements to the Licensed Area (or adjacent areas), including to:
  - 17.3.1 carry out any repairs or maintenance to the building or building services on the Land that is not the Licensee's responsibility under the terms of this Licence:
  - 17.3.2 construct new structures on the Licensed Area;
  - 17.3.3 alter, add to, extend, reduce the size of, or otherwise modify, existing structures on the Licensed Area; or
  - 17.3.4 carry out any other works that the Shire considers necessary.

# Shire's right to remedy default

17.4 The Shire may, if the Licensee is in default of any repair notice given by the Shire under this Licence or, if any repairs that the Licensee is responsible for under this Licence are required to be undertaken as a matter of urgency then, without prejudice to the Shire's rights under this Licence, the Shire and the Shire's employees and contractors with all necessary equipment at all reasonable times may enter the Licensed Area to carry out such works and the costs of carrying out such works shall be payable by the Licensee to the Shire on demand.

# Shire's right to deal with Land

17.5 The Shire may grant easements of support or any other easements or similar rights over any part of the Land or the Licensed Area or dedicate, transfer or otherwise deal with any part of the Land or the Licensed Area in favour of another person for any reason whatsoever.

### No undue interference

17.6 In exercising the Shire's rights in clause 17.3 to clause 17.5 (inclusive), the Shire must use its reasonable endeavours not to cause any undue interference with the Authorised Use but in no event will the Shire be responsible for any compensation or liable for any loss suffered by the Licensee.

# 18 Events of Default

### Default

- 18.1 An event of default occurs if:
  - 18.1.1 the Licence Fee is at any time unpaid for 30 days after becoming due whether formally demanded or not;
  - 18.1.2 the Licensee fails to comply with any of its other obligations under this Licence and that failure is not, in the reasonable opinion of the Shire, remediable;
  - 18.1.3 the failure described in clause 18.1.2 is remediable, and the Licensee does not remedy the failure within 30 days, or a longer period reasonably determined by the Shire after receipt by the Licensee of a notice from the Shire specifying the failure;
  - 18.1.4 in the event of insolvency, receivership, bankruptcy or liquidation of the Licensee: or
  - 18.1.5 if the Licensee makes or enters into or endeavour to make or enter into any composition assignment or other arrangement with or for the benefit of the Licensee's creditors.

# Shire's right to terminate

18.2 If an event of default occurs, the Shire may terminate this Licence by written notice to the Licensee.

# Other rights of Shire

Any action taken by the Shire under clause 17 is without prejudice to any other rights of the Shire and does not release the Licensee from liability under this Licence.

### 19 Termination

### **Licensed Area**

19.1 At the end or earlier termination of this Licence, the Licensee must ensure that the Licensed Area is in a condition consistent with the compliance of the Licensee's obligations during the Term and deliver to the Shire all keys, access cards and other security devices for the Licensed Area.

### Removal of Licensee's fixtures, fittings and chattels

At the end or earlier termination of this Licence, the Licensee must remove all the Licensee's chattels and, if required by the Shire, any fixture, fitting or structure

erected by the Licensee during the Term, and make good at the Licensee's cost any resulting damage and if not removed within five business days or a longer period as reasonably determined by the Shire after the date of termination, ownership of those chattels, fixtures, fittings and structures may at the Shire's election pass to the Shire or the Shire may in a proper and workmanlike manner remove them from the Licensed Area and either store them or forward them to a refuse collection centre.

19.3 The cost of making good the resulting damage and the cost of removal, storage and disposal shall be recoverable from the Licensee as a debt due on demand and the Shire shall not be responsible for any compensation or liable for any loss suffered by the Licensee.

### Survival

19.4 The covenants contained in this Licence which expressly or impliedly survive termination shall remain in full force and effect after the termination of this Licence without limit in time and shall not be or be deemed to be waived, merged or extinguished upon such termination.

# 20 Disputes

### Mediation

- 20.1 If a dispute arises in relation to this Licence, either Party may give the other a notice requiring that an attempt be made to resolve the dispute with the help of a mediator to be appointed jointly by the Parties.
- 20.2 If the Parties do not agree on a mediator within seven days after the notice is given, either Party is entitled to ask the Australian Commercial Disputes Centre (ACDC) or such other body that has similar powers at the time of the dispute to appoint the mediator.
- 20.3 The mediation is to be conducted in accordance with the procedure set out in the ACDC Commercial Mediation Agreement or, if at the relevant time there is no such agreement or an agreement substituted for it, in accordance with the procedure determined by the mediator in consultation with the Parties. Each of the Parties must co-operate fully with the mediator.
- 20.4 The Parties must each pay an equal share of the fees and expenses to which the mediator is entitled.

### Arbitration

- 20.5 If the dispute has not been resolved by mediation under clause 20.3 within two months of a party requiring mediation, either Party may give the other Party a notice requiring that a dispute be resolved by arbitration under the *Commercial Arbitration Act 2012* (WA) by an arbitrator appointed jointly by the Parties.
- 20.6 If the Parties do not agree on an arbitrator within seven days after the notice of arbitration is given, either Party is entitled to ask the ACDC or such other body that has similar powers at the time of the dispute to appoint the arbitrator.
- 20.7 The arbitration must be conducted in accordance with the *Commercial Arbitration Act* 2012 (WA). Each of the Parties must co-operate fully with the arbitrator.

20.8 Either Party is entitled to appeal to the Court of competent jurisdiction on any question of law arising out of an award.

### Right to seek injunctions

20.9 For the avoidance of any doubt, nothing in this clause 20 shall be construed as limiting the rights of either Party to seek urgent injunctive orders from a Court of competent jurisdiction to restrain the other Party from an ongoing or repetitive breach of this Licence where an order for damages would not be an adequate remedy.

# 21 Holding Over

21.1 If the Licensee continues to use the Licensed Area after the expiry of the Term with the consent of the Shire, the Licensee will be a monthly licensee of the Shire at the same rate as the then Licence Fee payable by the Licensee immediately prior to expiry of the Term.

- Any notice or communication given to a Party under this Licence is only given if it is in writing and sent in one of the following ways:
  - 22.1.1 Delivered or posted to that Party at its address and marked for the attention of the relevant department or officer (if any) set out below.
  - 22.1.2 Emailed to that Party at its email address and marked for the attention of the relevant department or officer (if any) set out below.

# Change of physical or email address

  - 22.3.1 If it is delivered, when it is left at the relevant address; or

- In the event that the Special Conditions are inconsistent with the terms of the Licence, then the Special Conditions shall prevail to the extent of such inconsistency.

# 24 Discretion of the Shire in its capacity as a Relevant Authority

24.1 Nothing in this Licence shall fetter or be construed as an attempt to fetter the discretion or the powers of the Shire in its capacity as a Relevant Authority under any Written Law and in particular does not fetter the Shire in its capacity as a Relevant Authority with regard to the approval or imposition of conditions on any approval required for the development of the Land or carrying out of any alterations, additions or improvements on the Licensed Area in accordance with the terms of this Licence.

### 25 Miscellaneous

### Approvals and consents

- 25.1 Unless this Licence expressly provides otherwise, a Party may give or withhold an approval or consent in that Party's absolute discretion and subject to any conditions determined by the Party. A Party is not obliged to give its reasons for giving or withholding a consent or approval or for giving a consent or approval subject to conditions.
- 25.2 Where this Licence refers to a matter being to the 'satisfaction' of a Party, this means to the satisfaction of that Party in its absolute discretion.

# **Entire agreement**

25.3 This Licence contains everything the Parties have agreed in relation to the subject matter it deals with. No Party can rely on an earlier written document or anything said or done by or on behalf of another Party before this Licence was executed.

#### **Further acts**

25.4 Each party must at its own expense promptly execute all documents and do or use reasonable endeavours to cause a third party to do all things that another Party from time to time may reasonably request in order to give effect to, perfect or complete this Licence and all transactions incidental to it.

### Governing law and jurisdiction

25.5 This Licence is governed by the law of Western Australia. The Parties submit to the non-exclusive jurisdiction of its courts and courts of appeal from them. The Parties will not object to the exercise of jurisdiction by those courts on any basis.

### Joint and individual liability and benefits

25.6 Except as otherwise set out in this Licence, any agreement, covenant, representation or warranty under this Licence by two or more persons binds them jointly and each of them individually, and any benefit in favour of two or more persons is for the benefit of them jointly and each of them individually.

### Severability

25.7 Each provision of this Licence is individually severable. If any provision is or becomes illegal, unenforceable or invalid in any jurisdiction it is to be treated as being severed from this Licence in the relevant jurisdiction, but the rest of this Licence will not be affected. The legality, validity and enforceability of the provision in any other jurisdiction will not be affected.

### Counterparts

25.8 This Licence may be executed in any number of counterparts each of which is an original and all of which constitute one and the same agreement.

### Variation

25.9 No variation of this Licence will be of any force or effect unless it is in writing and signed by each Party to this Licence.

### **Waivers**

- 25.10 A waiver of any right, power or remedy under this Licence must be in writing signed by the Party granting it. A waiver is only effective in relation to the particular obligation or breach in respect of which it is given. It is not to be taken as an implied waiver of any other obligation or breach or as an implied waiver of that obligation or breach in relation to any other occasion.

### **SUMMARY**

Funding applications submitted for the Community Sport and Recreation Facilities Fund (CSRFF) administered by the Department of Local Government, Sport and Cultural Industries are required to be assessed and ranked in order of priority for the local government area (LGA) prior to be submitted to the Department.

This report seeks the assessment of the sole application from Nyikina Mangala Community School within the Shire to the 2025 / 2026 Forward Planning round.

### DISCLOSURE OF ANY INTEREST

### **BACKGROUND**

The CSRFF provided financial support to community groups and local government authorities to develop basic sport and recreation infrastructure. Funds typically meet up to 50% of the project costs, however in certain circumstances projects in Aboriginal Communities can have up to 50% of the costs met. A total of \$20 million has been allocated for the 2025 / 26 funding round.

Applications are accepted within one of two funding streams;

- 1. Small grants for projects with a total project cost of \$7,500 to \$500,000 which can be completed within a 12-month period
- 2. Forward planning grants for projects with a total project cost of over \$500,000 which take between one and three years to complete.

Applications are currently open for the 2025 / 26 Forward Planning Grants program. Under the program guidelines and application process local governments are required to assess all applications and rank the applications in order of priority in the LGA. The assessment form is provided as Attachment One.

Nyikina Mangala Community School, located in the Jarlmadangah Burru Community, applied to the 2024 / 25 Forward Planning round. At the 13 October 2023 Ordinary Council Meeting Council the following resolution was made in relation to the application;

Ultimately the application was unsuccessful. Feedback received by the applicant suggested while the project was a good project the scope of it was too large. It was recommended a scaled down version of the project be resubmitted.

METIO is a for-purpose social enterprise who supports disadvantaged communities to access the resources and funding needed to build essential infrastructure by offering project development and project management services. They have been working with Nyikina Mangala Community School and the Jarlmadangah Burru Community on this and other infrastructure projects.

### STATUTORY ENVIRONMENT

Council officers assess each project and make a recommendation for the ranking of projects based on the DLGSC criteria and strategic overview. The Council officers' ranking recommendations have been independently peer reviewed.

Projects funded through the CSRFF Forward Planning Fund are generally larger scale infrastructure projects and are subject and may be subject to requirements under the;

- Planning and Development Act (2005)
- Planning and Development (Local Planning Schemes) Regulations 2015
- Building Act 2011 (WA),
- Building Regulations 2021 (WA), and
- National Construction Code.

### FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

This project is not expected to have any financial impact for the Shire. The total cost of this project is around \$2.3 million, with approximately \$1.08 million being sought from CSRFF. Nyikina Mangala Community School is planning on contributing \$100,000, with the remainder of the funding being sought through other grant programs such as Lottery West, the Association of Independent Schools, local mining companies and Commonwealth grants.

The applicant has queried if the Shire could potentially contribute to the project, however at the time of writing this report the applicant has not submitted a formal request. The applicant has been advised that any request for funding will need to be submitted through the Community Development Grants program and will be assessed through that process. Any successful funding request would be administered through the associated budget area.

Any other financial impacts for the Shire will occur through the course of normal business, such as through planning and building approval processes.

# **CONSULTATION**

Nyikina Mangala Community School initiated and led a consultation process for the project. This consultation was complemented by a series of meetings with community directors and school leadership.

The Shire has not undertaken any direct consultation on this project. However, feedback received during the consultation on the Shire's Strategic Community Plan 2021 – 2031 identified the need for recreation facilities in communities to be upgraded.

### **COMMENT**

One funding application has been received for the 2025/26 Forward Planning stream of the CSRFF program.

Projects are ranked on the strength of the application, participation numbers, and ability to increase physical activity and potential impact as well as consultation with the Department of Local Government, Sport and Cultural Industries – Sport and Recreation and the applicant.

Projects that are directly related to the delivery of the sport (surface or grounds) or will increase participation (lighting) are usually ranked higher over those that support the sporting environment.

The application is from the Nyikina Mangala Community School and is seeking financial assistance for stage one of an upgrade of the existing basketball court. The part of the project aims to;

- Repair and resurface the existing concrete slab court.
- Put a permanent shade structure over the court.
- Landscape surrounding of the court to enhance aesthetics and functionality.
- Construct a small stage and install seating for community events and gatherings.
- Add shade cloth to existing posts over the children's playground.

Council is required to assess the application as being 'Satisfactory', 'Unsatisfactory' or 'Not Applicable' across ten area. Below is a summary of the information provided in the application form and supporting documentation in relation to each of the assessment areas;

# **Project justification**

The current basketball court is the only sporting facility located within the community, with the next closest publicly available facility being located in Derby. The current court is exposed to the harsh Kimberley elements which has caused significant damage to the court. The court remains vulnerable to the elements.

The project aims to provide much needed space for recreation, sports and other community activities. The addition of the shade cover will allow the facility to be used in all weather conditions, allowing physical activity and recreation to be undertaken more regularly, as well as slowing down wear and tear.

The project will also see the court becomes a multipurpose facility increasing opportunities and rates of usage for the community as a whole.

# Management planning

Nyikina Mangala Community School has engaged METIO to oversee project development and to serve as project manager. METIO has substantial experience in this in remote locations, having successfully delivered similar projects in other Communities. In making this decision to school's board has acknowledged their limited knowledge in project management and high staff turnover which could potentially impact the project.

# Financial viability

This project is largely reliant on grant funding, with financial contributions being sought from DLGSC, along with other government agencies and philanthropic organisations. The Nyikina Mangala School will contribute \$100,000 of funds currently held in their reserves to the project. Without the funding the project is unlikely to go ahead.

# Potential to increase physical activity

There are no other sporting facilities in the community or near-by communities, with the closest publicly available sporting facilities in Derby. The proposed project will increase physical activity by providing a safe playing surface through repair works, and an undercover facility which can be used all year around in differing weather conditions.

# Sustainability

The facility has been designed with sustainability and efficiency in mind.

Council is also required to provide comment around planning requirements associated with this project. Preliminary discussions with the Shire's Planners, noting they have not reviewed the physical plans and have only been advised of the project verbally, has indicated stage one of the project will likely require a Building Permit and a Development Application.

Whilst this project is an important project for the community the Shire is unlikely to be able to contribute financially due to other recreation and facility infrastructure projects which the Shire is needing to undertake within our limited capital works budget. The facility is located within the Jarlmadangah Burru Community and is owned by the Community. Beyond relevant planning / building / health approvals no involvement by the Shire is required.

Project Title (brief and specific): SPORTS COURT UPGRADE

Project Description:

The Jarlmadangah Burru Community and Nyikina Mangala Community School, are seeking to upgrade its existing sports court. This upgrade includes the erection of a metal shade structure over the existing concrete slab to ensure all-weather usability, the construction of a small stage for various school and community events, and landscaping enhancements to beautify the surroundings.

Established in 2000, the independent school serves the 40-60 community members, predominantly of Nyikina and Mangala descent, offering education from Kindergarten to Year Ten. The Jarlmadangah Burru Community, a recipient of the Tiddy Town award multiple times, stands as a testament to its pride and resilience. With a growing population and an increasing number of community members returning, there's a pressing need to bolster community infrastructure. This upgrade aims to support this growth, offer better and more social and sports activities, attract more residents, and alleviate urban pressures and associated social issues.

Currently, the shared sports facility between the school and community consists of a worn-out concrete slab with aged basketball hoops and faded lines. It lacks a protective cover against the Kimberley's harsh elements and doesn't offer essential amenities like toilets and showers. Additional to this, currently the community doesn't have any space that can be used for night-time events. The upgraded facility will serve diverse purposes, including:

- School sports programs, including basketball, netball, tennis, and more.
- The school's social and emotional wellbeing initiatives.
- Hosting community meetings, funerals, and other cultural events.
- Facilitating meetings, training sessions, social events, and consultations for visiting service providers.
- Organizing sports carnivals with participation from neighbouring communities and sports holiday programs.
- Hosting music and performing arts events, including night-time events.
- Providing a surface for activities like skating and scootering, as no other suitable surface currently exists in the community.

This initiative is a collaborative effort to enhance both the school and community sports facilities. To promote sustainability and low maintenance costs, the project will incorporate solar panels for energy efficiency and a rainwater collection system. With the backing of numerous stakeholders, this community and school-driven project aims to uplift the quality of life and provide a multifunctional space for all residents. More information about the project can be found in the "Project Proposal" document supplied.  This project has been prepared on a pro bono basis by METIO, a "for purpose" social enterprise focused on supporting disadvantaged communities in building and caring for infrastructure. METIO then undertook a site visit, engaging in in-depth discussions with the community to understand the project's feasibility and requirements. Once a concept design was drafted, it was showcased to the community for their insights and feedback. This collaborative approach culminated in the design and project proposal receiving official approval in August 2023. Throughout this process, various stakeholders were consulted, and many have since issued letters of support for the project.

Initially, multiple design options were considered. Conversations were then held with potential builders to gauge preliminary costs. To finalize and consolidate the cost details, a professional cost estimator was employed to prepare the comprehensive estimate. The cost estimates is annexed to the Project Proposal document submits with the application.

This separation ensures that if there's a need for a future replacement or upgrade of the slab, it can be done without disrupting the metal structure. These design choices ensure longevity and adaptability of the facility over time.

Yes, there are significant operational constraints to consider during the construction phase of our project. The Kimberley region of Western Australia typically undergoes its rainy season from November to April. This period often brings heavy rainfall and potential flooding. As such, it's imperative to strategize our construction timeline to circumvent these wetter months. Ideally, construction should take place between May and November to ensure that adverse weather conditions do not impede our progress. We are acutely aware of these constraints and have planned our project timeline accordingly to prevent any unforeseen delays.

24 How many construction and/or ongoing jobs will your project create? (Only applicable if your project is over \$1 million)

During the construction phase, we estimate that the project will create approximately 10 job opportunities. Several community members have already expressed interest in these roles. To facilitate their involvement, we will assist them in obtaining White Cards. Additionally, we will include provisions in the tender to ensure that the selected builder prioritizes the employment of community members for certain construction roles.

Beyond construction, the facility is expected to generate around 4 ongoing casual job opportunities for community members. These roles will span cleaning, maintenance, gardening, and educational support, further enhancing the community's employment prospects.

We will work with the regional CDP program manager to offer on job opportunities.

Provision to uses local labour will be included in the main contractors contract and clearly stated in the tender documentation.

Further to the above, METIO's tenders always include provisions to precure the services of local indigenous owned business, in particular in remote settings such this project.

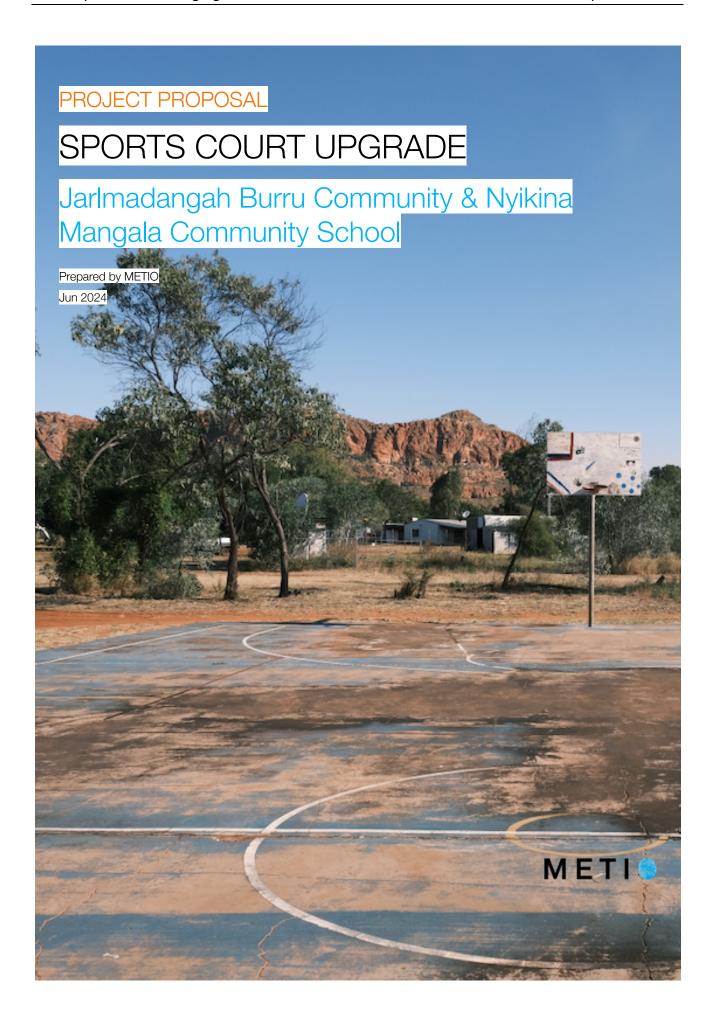

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#### **Project Description**

The Jarlmadangah Burru Community and Nyikina Mangala Community School are seeking to upgrade the existing and only sports court in the community. This upgrade includes the erection of a metal shade structure over the existing concrete slab to ensure all-weather usability, the addition of an ablutions block, the construction of a small stage for various school and community events, and landscaping enhancements to beautify the surroundings.

Established in 2000, the independent school serves the 40-60 community members, predominantly of Nyikina and Mangala descent, offering education from Kindergarten to Year Ten. The Jarlmadangah Burru Community, a recipient of the Tiddy Town award multiple times, stands as a testament to its pride and resilience. With a growing population and an increasing number of community members returning, there's a pressing need to bolster community infrastructure. This upgrade aims to support this growth, offer better and more social and sports activities, attract more residents, and alleviate urban pressures and associated social issues.

Currently, the shared sports facility between the school and community consists of a worn-out concrete slab with aged basketball hoops and faded lines. It lacks a protective cover against the Kimberley's harsh elements and doesn't offer essential amenities like toilets and showers. Additional to this, currently the community doesn't have any space that can be used for night-time events. The upgraded facility will serve diverse purposes, including:

- School sports programs, including basketball, netball, tennis, and more.
- The school's social and emotional wellbeing initiatives.
- Hosting community meetings, funerals, and other cultural events.
- Facilitating meetings, training sessions, social events, and consultations for visiting service providers.
- Organizing sports carnivals with participation from neighbouring communities and sports holiday programs.
- Hosting music and performing arts events, including night-time events.
- Providing a surface for activities like skating and scootering, as no other suitable surface currently exists in the community.

This initiative is a collaborative effort to enhance both the community and school sports facilities. To promote sustainability and low maintenance costs, the project will incorporate solar panels for energy efficiency and a rainwater collection system. With the backing of numerous stakeholders, this community and school-driven project aims to uplift the quality of life and provide a multifunctional space for all residents.

This project was initially prepared on a pro bono basis by METIO, a "for purpose" social enterprise focused on supporting disadvantaged communities in building and caring for infrastructure. Please see METIO, capability statement as annexed to the "Project Proposal" document supplied.

#### About Jarlmadangah Burru Community

Jarlmadangah Burru Community is a remote Aboriginal community located on the ancestral lands of the Nyikina and Mangala peoples, about 100 km south-east of Derby in the West Kimberley region of Western Australia. The

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community was established in 1989 by elders who wanted to return to their traditional country and live according to their culture and law. The community's name means "our place of rest" in Nyikina language.

Jarlmadangah Burru Community is home to about 80-100 people, who share a strong sense of identity and belonging. The community values its culture, language, and spirituality, and strives to preserve and transmit them to future generations. The community also seeks to improve the health, education, and economic opportunities of its members, while maintaining a harmonious relationship with the environment. The community operates several social enterprises, such as a cultural tourism business, a pastoral company, and a ranger program, that provide employment and income for the community members. The community also runs a health clinic, a store, a media center, and the community school. Jarlmadangah Burru Community is an example of a self-reliant, resilient, and proud Aboriginal community that celebrates its heritage and contributes to the wider society.

#### About Nyikina Mangala Community School

Nyikina Mangala Community School holds a powerful vision - to deliver tailored educational programs that prioritize language, culture, and life skills, empowering the children to become resilient, well-rounded individuals. The school recognizes the importance of nurturing a deep connection to language and culture while equipping students with necessary life skills. By embodying this vision, Nyikina Mangala Community School strives to provide a supportive and enriching educational environment that empowers its students to become future community leaders.

Established in July 2000 without government assistance, the school's humble beginnings reflect the community's determination to establish an Aboriginal community school. It gained registration in December 2000 and currently educates students from Kindergarten to Year Ten.

Nyikina Mangala Community School aims to empower the children of Jarlmadangah Burru by providing tailored educational programs that promote strength, health, and reliability. #### Existing facilities

The only sports facility for the entire community is the sports court objects of this proposal, which is situated in the school premises.

The school has various facilities to support the educational needs of its students. The main building serves as the central hub of the school, comprising two classrooms, a kitchen, resource rooms, the principal's office, a meeting room, toilets, storage spaces, and a spacious veranda. These well-equipped spaces provide a conducive environment for teaching, learning, and administrative activities.

In addition to the main building, the school features an uncovered kids' playground where students can engage in outdoor play and recreational activities. The playground offers a safe and enjoyable space for children to socialize, exercise, and develop their motor skills.

For sports and physical activities, the school currently has an uncovered basketball court. However, as part of the project, the basketball court will undergo an upgrade, including the installation of a shade/cover and other necessary enhancements to promote all-weather and night-time usability. This improvement will enable students and the community to engage in sports and recreational activities regardless of weather conditions, further promoting physical activity and community engagement.

To accommodate the school staff, there are three staff houses on the premises. These houses provide comfortable living spaces for the dedicated educators and staff members who contribute to the school's vibrant learning community.

Overall, Nyikina Mangala Community School's facilities are in good condition and are designed to create a conducive and inclusive learning environment, fostering the holistic development of students and supporting the school's mission of empowering the children of Jarlmadangah Burru.

#### Needs assessment

The need for a dedicated sports facility was jointly recognized by the community and school leadership. To validate this, METIO was tasked with drafting a project proposal, which included a site inspection and discussions with community members and directors.

The absence of a sports facility was seen as a significant gap, affecting both students and the broader community. This project aims to fill this gap by providing a space for sports, recreation, and community events.

A design team was brought in to offer multiple design options, keeping in mind the community's preferences. After community consultations, a design was chosen that best met the community's vision.

The school led the consultation process, with regular meetings involving community directors and school authorities. METIO's site visit added practical insights. The community's feedback on the draft design was actively sought, leading to its official approval in August 2023. Throughout this process, various stakeholders expressed their support for the project.

#### Project Scope

The project scope encompasses the following key elements:

• Repair and Resurface: The existing concrete slab of the sports court will undergo necessary repairs and resurfacing to ensure a safe and suitable playing surface.

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- Shade/Cover Construction: A durable and weather-resistant shade or cover will be constructed over the
  existing concrete slab. This will provide protection from harsh weather conditions, enabling all-weather
  usability and allowing students and community members to engage in sports activities throughout the year.
- Toilet block: Construction of a well-equipped support toilet block, complete with shower facilities. This
  addition will be seamlessly integrated with the court layout, addressing safety concerns and adhering to best
  practices for gender inclusivity. The toilet block is a vital component to ensure convenience and accessibility
  for all court users.
- Landscaping: The surrounding area of the court will be landscaped to enhance the aesthetics and create a
  pleasant environment. This may include the addition of green spaces, trees, shrubs, and other landscaping
  features
- Seating and Small Stage Installation: Comfortable seating arrangements will be installed around the court to
  provide spectators and participants with a suitable area to observe and support sports events. Additionally, a
  small stage will be set up for various community gatherings and performances. This can be build out of local
  stone.
- Retractable Hoops: New retractable hoops will be installed, suspended from the cover (?), allowing for easy adjustment of height and providing clearance for other activities.
- **LED Illumination:** Energy-efficient LED lighting will be installed to illuminate the sports court during evening. This will enhance safety, extend usability, and provide a well-lit environment for activities.
- Rainwater Collection System: A rainwater collection system will be implemented to collect and store
  rainwater for gardening purposes. This sustainable approach will contribute to water conservation and support
  the maintenance of the surrounding landscaping and other community needs.
- Shade Cloth Installation: Shade cloth will be added to the existing posts over the kids' playground area. This additional measure will provide shade and protection from direct sunlight, creating a comfortable and safe play environment for children.

#### **Project Objectives**

The project objectives are as follows:

- **Promote Physical Activity:** By upgrading the sports court and providing a safe and suitable playing surface, the project aims to encourage physical activity among students and community members. This will contribute to their overall health and well-being and may lead to increased school attendance.
- All-Weather and Night-Time Usability: The installation of a shade/cover over the sports court, along with LED lighting, will enable the facility to be used during various weather conditions and extend its usability into evening hours. This will ensure that sports activities and community events can take place regardless of the time of day or weather conditions, further enhancing opportunities for students to engage in extracurricular activities.
- Enhance Safety and Security: The repair and resurfacing of the concrete slab, along with the installation of retractable hoops and proper lighting, will enhance safety for users of the sports court. Additionally, the shade cloth over the kids' playground area will provide a safe and shaded space for children to play, contributing to a secure and welcoming school environment that can positively impact student attendance.
- Strengthen Community Engagement: The upgraded sports court will serve as a gathering place for
  community members, fostering social connections and strengthening community engagement. The addition of
  seating and a small stage will facilitate various community events and performances, further enhancing
  community interaction and participation. Increased community involvement can also lead to improved
  relationships with the school and potentially result in higher student attendance.
- Promote cultural sensitivity and inclusivity: One of the key objectives of this project is to ensure cultural
  sensitivity and inclusivity in all aspects. This includes conducting thorough research on the cultural norms,
  values, and traditions of the target audience to ensure that the project's content and messaging are respectful
  and appropriate. By incorporating cultural sensitivity, we aim to foster a deeper understanding and
  appreciation of diverse cultures, promoting inclusivity and avoiding any potential cultural misunderstandings or
  biases.
- Expand Recreational Opportunities: The project aims to broaden recreational opportunities for students and
  community members by providing a versatile and modern sports facility. This will encourage participation in a
  wide range of sports and physical activities, promoting a healthy and active lifestyle. Increased access to
  recreational opportunities can positively impact students' enthusiasm for attending school and engaging in
  extracurricular activities.
- Climate Resilience: One of the key objectives of this project is to enhance climate resilience in the cycloneprone area, considering the potential risks of flooding and other climate-related challenges. By incorporating

climate resilience strategies and measures into the project design and development, we aim to ensure the long-term sustainability and adaptability of the proposed infrastructure.

 Job Opportunities: The project will generate casual work opportunities in areas such as labor, art projects, gardening, and more. Additionally, to benefit a wider audience, we aim to collaborate with regional CDP program facilitators to create job opportunities for its members.

#### Stakeholders

The project stakeholders for the Nyikina Mangala Community School sports court upgrade are:

- Project owner: Jarlmadangah Burru Community and Nyikina Mangala Community School are the project owners, however the school is formally responsibility for the project as it is in is site. They will benefit from the improved sports court facility and increased opportunities for physical activity, community engagement, and student attendance.
- Project Development and Project Management: METIO is responsible for the project's development and
  management. METIO will oversee the entire process, from initial planning to project completion, ensuring that
  the objectives are met and stakeholders' needs are addressed.
- Donors: The project requires funding from various potential donors. These might include the Association of Independent Schools of Western Australia (AISWA), Lottery West, the Department of Local Government, Sport and Cultural Industries and NIAA. Their financial contributions will play a crucial role in the successful implementation of the project. The school will identify further partnerships and donors for the project.
- Consultants: The project will engagement external consultants, including an architect and landscaping
  architect whom will be identified to design the upgraded sports court. Engineers Without Borders Australia will
  identify a probono engineering firm to provide expertise to ensure the structural integrity and functionality of
  the facility.
- Building Approvals: The Shire of Derby-West Kimberley will be responsible for granting the necessary building approvals and permits for the project. Their involvement ensures compliance with local regulations and standards.

#### **Project Deliverables**

This project will be divided in two stages for funding reasons. The deliverables for this project include:

#### Stage 1:

- Repaired and resurfaced existing concrete slab of the sports court.
- Built shade/cover structure over the sports court.
- Landscaped surroundings of the court to enhance aesthetics and functionality.
- Installed seating and a small stage for community events and gatherings.
- Added shade cloth to existing posts over the kids' playground area.

#### Stage 2:

- Construction of a well-equipped support toilet block, complete with shower facilities, including accessible and gender neutral spaces.
- Installed new retractable hoops suspended on the cover for flexible usage.
- Installed a rainwater collection system for gardening purposes.
- Installed LED illumination for all-weather and night-time usability.

These deliverables encompass the key elements necessary to transform the existing sports court into a versatile, safe, and engaging space that promotes physical activity, community involvement, and student attendance.

#### Concept design

The architectural design for the facility has been crafted by Troppo Architects from their Perth office. They have collaborated closely with the school and METIO to ensure the design is fit for purpose and addresses the specific needs of the project.

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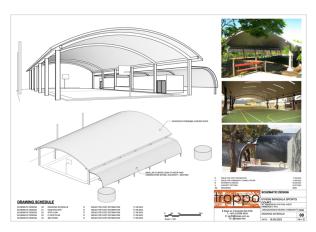


Figure 8 - Concept design

#### Preliminary Budget Overview

The following outlines the anticipated project expenditure and the proposed funding distribution/request. The school has initiated discussions with various donors and is currently exploring multiple avenues for project funding.

While the school's preference is to execute the project in a single stage, there is flexibility to divide the project into two stages for funding considerations. These two stages would comprise the construction of the shade structure first, followed by the toilet block on a later stage.

#### **Project Constraints**

• Limited Project Funding: One of the primary constraints is the insufficient funds available to the project owner, Jarlmadangah Burru Community and Nyikina Mangala Community School. As a result, they will need to seek donors to secure the necessary finances. However, it is important to note that donors often do not fund projects entirely, necessitating the identification and coordination of multiple donors to cover the project costs. Additionally, the project can be split into stages to facilitate funding attainment.

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- **Diverse Donor Funding Timelines:** Donors typically have different funding timelines and processes, which can present a challenge in coordinating the project's financial aspects. Managing and aligning these timelines to ensure a continuous flow of funds may require careful planning, communication, and coordination with each donor
- Remote Community Location: The project's remote location poses challenges due to factors such as limited
  accessibility, long travel distances, and a scarcity of local resources. These factors can increase construction
  costs, logistics complexities, and project delivery timelines. Overcoming these challenges will require effective
  logistical planning and resource management.
- Seasonal Constraints: The project may face constraints associated with the region's seasonal variations,
  particularly during the rainy season and hot season. Inclement weather conditions and extreme temperatures
  can affect construction activities, site access, and worker productivity. Mitigation strategies, such as
  scheduling construction activities during more favorable weather periods and implementing appropriate safety
  measures, will be necessary.
- Regulatory and Approval Requirements: Compliance with regulatory frameworks, obtaining necessary
  building permits, and meeting approval requirements from relevant authorities can introduce constraints to the
  project. Delays or challenges in obtaining approvals can impact the project schedule and add additional
  administrative burdens. Close collaboration with the Shire of Derby-West Kimberley and adherence to local
  regulations will be crucial.
- Community Engagement and Consultation: Ensuring meaningful community engagement and consultation
  throughout the project can be a challenge. It requires effective communication, cultural sensitivity, and
  involvement of community members in decision-making processes. The project team must invest time and
  effort in building trust, fostering participation, and addressing community concerns to achieve project success.
- Limited Local Workforce and Skills: The availability of skilled labor and local workforce can be limited in remote areas. This constraint may necessitate sourcing labor from outside the community, resulting in increased costs due to travel, accommodation, and associated logistics. Strategies such as training and capacity building programs can help address this constraint over the long term. The school can engage with regional CDP program provider to identify a suitable workforce.

#### Project Risks

#### **BACKGROUND**

At the April 2024 Ordinary Council (24 April 2024) Meeting Council considered a recommendation to make changes to the existing Community Development Grant Program to improve the administration of the program, as well as to better meet community needs. Changes made included;

- The establishment of a Community Grant Review Group consisting of the Shire President and two elected members to determine the outcome of funding applications.
- An increase in the frequency of grant applications being assessed, and
- The establishment of a new funding stream for individuals or organisations seeking funding support to participate in representative sport, recreation, arts, cultural or community events.

- Approves adding to existing Shire Community Grants guidelines a funding scheme to support individuals and groups attending representative sport, recreation, arts, cultural or community events effective the commencement of the 2024/25 financial year;
- 5. Allocates a budget amount, in line with standard budget approval, to support individuals attending representative events, making the following funding levels available under the scheme, noting that once the annual budget is exhausted no further funding will be granted until the following financial year;
  - a. Regional level representation \$500 (ex GST) per individual
  - b. State level representation \$750 (ex GST) per individual
  - National level representation \$1000 (ex GST) per individual
- Directs the CEO to present to Council the draft updated funding guidelines, at the Ordinary Council Meeting of 30 May 2024.

A subsequent review of the minutes raised concerns that decision 1, the delegation of the determination of grant applications to a sub-group of Council, is not in line with the *Local Government Act 1995*. Advice received indicated the sub-group either needed to be formed as a Committee of Council or delegation for approval given to the CEO.

#### STATUTORY ENVIRONMENT

Part 5 – Administration of the *Local Government Act 1995* provides framework around the decision-making process of Council and the delegation of powers and duties to committees of Council or the CEO.

Part 6 – Financial Management of the *Local Government Act 1995* applies to this report in that each year Council allocates an annual budget to donate to community organisations through the Community Funding Scheme.

#### **POLICY IMPLICATIONS**

Policy F19 – Community Funding Scheme provides guidance as to the provision of financial and non-monetary assistance to community groups and non-for-profit organisations by the Shire.

#### **FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS**

The amount of money available to be distributed to community groups each year is allocated as part of Council's budgeting process. In the 202/25 financial year \$76,088 has been allocated for the Community Funding Scheme. \$30,000 of this has been allocated for Events Sponsorship, with the remainder being distributed between the Community Grants Program, Community Representative Grants and ad-hoc Council decisions.

#### **CONSULTATION**

Feedback raising concern about the original endorsement was provide by an external consultant. This was discussed with some members of the Executive Team and the Community Funding Review Group. No external consultation was deemed necessary.

#### **COMMENT**

Under the current process applications received to the Community Grants Program and the Community Representative Grants are assessed on a monthly basis. Applications are initially reviewed at an officer level with the recommendations being made to the Community Grants Review Group. The Community Grants Review Group consists of relevant Shire officers, the Shire President and two Councillors (currently Cr O'Meara and Foley). The Councillors are the voting members in the group and make the final decision.

In order to ensure the approval of funding under the Community Funding Scheme compliant with decision making processes under the Act Council has the following options;

Option 1 - All funding applications are referred to Council

Under this option all grant applications received would be referred to the next available Council meeting. This may result in the decisions being made up to 2 months after the applications for the monthly round have closed depending on the timing of the close of the funding round, processing time and closure of reports for the Council meeting. The majority of the projects that are the subject of an application occur a month or two after they have been submitted. This may lead to applicants having insufficient time to organise and plan their event with knowledge the funding has been secured. In the case of Community Representative Grant applications, they may not know two months before they have been selected for the event they are attending.

### Option 2 - A Committee of Council is established

Council may choose to establish a formal Committee of Council to consider applications. This committee will review all applications received and make recommendations on the outcome. The recommendations are then referred to Council for ratification. This process will essentially add another layer of administrative requirements, without seeing any additional benefits. Similar to option one this process may result in delays to the decision-making process as the recommendations must be ratified by Council.

Option 3 – Approve CEO delegation to make decisions on applications.

Council has the option of delegating authority to the CEO to decide on the outcome of the grant application. This could be done solely at CEO discretion, or by the CEO on the advice a group of Councillors (such as the existing Community Grants Review Group formed at the April OCM). This option will allow for grants to be assessed in timely manner and reduces the overall administrative burden relating to Council meetings. Existing Shire policy and grant guidelines would require than any grants which don't meet program guidelines must be referred to Council for decision.
