THUNDERBIRD PER RELEASED FOR REVIEW

The Thunderbird PER is released for public review from 16 January to 13 February 2017.

Located midway between Derby and Broome, Thunderbird is a large-scale, long life mineral sands mining and processing project with low environmental impacts and long term economic and community benefits.

Sheffield Resources is proposing to undertake mineral sands mining from the Thunderbird deposit, and to transport product to Derby and Broome for export through their ports.

Sheffield has prepared the PER in accordance with Environmental Protection Authority (EPA) procedures.

The PER describes the Thunderbird proposal, examines the potential environmental effects and proposes environmental management procedures.

Sheffield considers that the potential impacts to the environment can be adequately managed to meet the EPA environmental objectives.
